A SCRATCH ON THE 6c INLAND EXCHANGE PLATE

For a considerable time the 6c Inland Exchange of our First Issue has been a particular favorite of the writer's. This stamp was issued May 12, 1863, somewhat later than most of the issue, to satisfy a requirement for the tax on short term, low value promissory notes levied by the amendment of March 3, 1863 to the original Revenue Act of July 1, 1862. As enough perforating capacity had been acquired by the contractor, Butler & Carpenter, by this time it was never issued imperforate or part perforate. The plate seems to have been very well made for there is no evidence of any double transfers and, because only about 12,000 impressions were made, there was little wear and none of the stamps show any indications of reentry.

The only plate variety of any consequence known to the writer is shown in the accompanying illustration. It is a strong scratch running from the S of SIX at the left, downward and to the right into the center of the figure 6 in the lower left corner. More than one copy has been examined and the variety is constant. It is prominent and readily seen on examination with the unaided eye. From a study of the shades and papers used for the 6c Inland Exchange it would seem that about seven or more printings were made, but the damage occurred late in the period of use, as it is seen so infrequently. Plating this stamp from the position dots in the upper right corner would be relatively easy were it not for the fact that multiples larger than pairs or strips of three are so difficult to find. Communication is sought from any collector who might be able to shed light on the position of the scratch by having it in a multiple of any size.

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BUREAU "PRINTING" ERROR —ANOTHER OPINION

One of our readers directs our attention to the article we reprinted from Stamps by George B. Sloane in which Mr. Sloane gives his explanation of the error which is seen on some of the U.S. Tax Paids. (See The American Revenuer, February 1965 or Stamps, June 12, 1954). Mr. Sloane states that the error occurred "because the engraver omitted the two side strokes that would have completed the 'T'". He further says that, "Mr. Schuhmacher also found some of the same stamps with imprints that were correct, confirming my previously expressed belief that a multiple relief transfer roll was used for these imprints, likely carrying two imprints on the roll, one with the error, the other correct."

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It does not seem quite logical that two dies would be engraved for the same subject when it would be easier to take up two reliefs from the same die onto the transfer roll, nor does it seem probable that even if two dies were engraved that the error would not be found, and easily corrected, when the die proof was pulled. A more logical explanation is that two reliefs, both without the error originally, were on the roll, but that during use a relief break occurred in one relief that was not noticed at the time, and entries were made onto the plate with the broken roll, as well as with the good one. This sort of a break in the relief is what one might expect if the heat treatment of the roll was not quite right, and the rocking in was done up and down rather than across the lettering.

SPRINGFIELD LIST OF FOOD TAXPAIDS Sherwood Springer, ARA #399

At a recent meeting of the Los Angeles Revenue group, a worthy suggestion was made on the subject of cataloguing U. S. taxpaid revenues. As you know, it has been this writer's aim to incorporate the listings of the 1912 Springfield list in the Springer Catalogue. The former, however, since it was compiled from government records, included many varieties which, as far as we know, do not now exist. In the current catalogue, I wish to mclude only those varieties that are verified as being in someone's collection.

The suggestion was made that in some cases I have the Springfield listings appear in The American Revenuer before listing in the catalogue. This will give collectors a chance to report the varieties they have before I begin making up pages, and avoid some of the additions that inevitably follow an edition.

So here are the food stamps, other than the oleomargarines, as listed by Bartlett and Norton.

Adulterated Butter Stamps

Act of May 9, 1902 fixed a tax of 10c a pound upon adulterated butter (whatever that was).

Series of 1902. Design unknown. Values prepared were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 lbs.

Export Adulterated Butter Stamps

Series of 1902. Design unknown. 40,000 were printed.

Process or Renovated Butter Stamps

First series of 1902. Tax rate ¹/₄c lb. Type set design in black with double line border. Flying eagle with flag. Number of pounds given in large orange numerals in center. White paper. Values were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60 and 100 lbs.

Second series of 1902. Engraved. Inscription: "Process or Renovated Butter Stamp." Justice seated in large initial "R". Orange numerals in center. Black. Values were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 lbs.

Series of 1907. New design of Justice in upper left corner. The words

"or Renovated" are omitted, leaving "Process Butter." White paper. Black.

Type I. Date "190—". Line under control number. Values were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 lbs. Type II. Date "190—". No line under control number. Values were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 lbs.

Type III. Date "19—". No line. Values were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 lbs.

Series of 1916 (issued after the Springfield list). Smaller size. Figures of value in lower right corner. Values of 10, 20, 30 and 40 lbs. have been seen and probably higher were produced. What do you have?

Mixed Flour Stamps

Act of June 13, 1898 placed a tax of 4c a barrel on mixed flour.

First series of 1898. Rough lithographed stamp in green with Liberty head with pole and cap at bottom. Coupons at left, denoting size of package. Stamp indicates no value without coupons.

A-dark blue paper. B-pale green paper.

Second series of 1898. Engraved. Head of woman at bottom. Coupons at left. No other value. Black.

A-date line "190-". B-date line "19-".

Series of 1911. Similar to last. Blue paper. Black.

Series of 1916. Much smaller (87 x 38 mm). Black on blue paper. Figure of value in upper left corner. These were used through the 1930's. No. series inscription. Values were $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{4}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ bbl. All values are rouletted $\frac{2}{2}$ and 7.

Filled Cheese Stamps

These were printed and issued but who has seen any (and what was filled cheese?)

Series of 1897. Values were 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 lbs. So there you are. You will be helping the project if you will jot down the series and the values you have of the foregoing and mail to me at 6719 Seventh Ave., Los Angeles, Calif. 90043.

THE 15c INLAND EXCHANGE DOUBLE IMPRESSION



Of the eight double impressions known on 1st Issue Revenues, the one on the 15c Inland Exchange is one of the most striking. Probably at least one sheet of these stamps escaped the inspection of the printers, Butler & Carpenter, and was issued and used. As the illustration above shows, the second impression is displaced downward and to the left about ½ mm, giving the stamp a very blurry appearance. However the second impression is clear and complete, although it is not as heavily inked as the original.

A copy of this rarity (not the copy illustrated above) was sold in Robert A. Siegel's 276th Sale held October 6-7. 1964.

REVENUERS WIN IN TOUGH COMPETITION

Two members of our Association have recently won awards for their exhibits of revenue stamps in competition with outstanding collections of postage stamps, attesting to the increased interest in revenues and added recognition of our specialty.

Mr. John D. Laurenz, ARA #667,

of Saginaw, Michigan, finished next to the Grand Award in the U. S. category at the Peninsular State Philatelic Exhibition held in connection with the 27th P. S. P. S. Convention in Saginaw on March 13 and 14, 1965. Mr. Laurenz won Grand Awards in this show in 1963 and 1964 for his Match and Medicine and Revenues on Original Documents in an area that is a hot bed of philatelic activity.

At the A. P. S. Spring Meeting, held in connection with the March Party at which the Garfield-Perry Stamp Club of Cleveland celebrated their 75th anniversary, Mr. F. W. Daniels, ARA #278, was awarded the 3rd place honors on March 19, 20, 21, 1965. Mr. Daniels' exhibit of First Issue was originally entered as "Not for Competition," but the judges felt that such outstanding material was worthy of an award.

These members are to be congratulated on their fine showing, and thanked for the splendid representation they have made for the American Revenue Association.

EARLY MULTIPLE LISTING TO BE AVAILABLE

The Bureau Issues Association has been running a listing of large multiple pieces of early U. S. Revenue stamps, covering the period from 1862 to 1881. The list prepared by A. R. A. Director George T. Turner is being published in continued form starting with the March 1965 Bureau Specialist.

Through an arrangement between the A. R. A. and the B. I. A., the list will be available in completed form, as a separate booklet, to A. R. A. members at a nominal cost. An announcement will be made later.

This listing is an updating of the data previously published in the Revenue Unit Column of the American Philatelist, the journal of the American Philatelic Society, during 1939 when Mr. Turner was Chairman of the Revenue Unit. This new and revised list will be most welcome to students of our early fiscal issues.

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PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

A short while ago, the history of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing made its long anticipated appearance. This book entitled "History of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing 1862-1962" and published by the Treasury Department is most welcome to philatelists and numismatists for it gives much insight into the history and operation of the source of the bits of paper that are of interest to them. While the price is a bit high (\$7 from the Superintendent of Documents), the volume is well worth the cost, particularly to revenue collectors. It contains a number of illustrations of revenue stamps and data on their design and production.

Literature on revenues is somewhat difficult to obtain at times, and back issues of this journal are much sought after for the wealth of information contained in some issues. While a list of back issues available from the Editor is published from time to time, there are still a number that are not available. It is possible that we may be able to furnish reproduced copies of our issues to members at a nominal price if there is sufficient interest to make it worth while. Members desiring back numbers not for sale by the Editor are requested to write to me giving the issues in which they would be interested.

Our New York Chapter is well under way. If there are groups in other centers who might be able to form a chapter, it would be welcome if they would let me know so that particulars may be furnished.

W. S. KYLE, A. MESSINGER Bruce Miller, ARA #732

The private match die bearing the name "A. Messinger" (RO133) is identical with that of "W. S. Kyle" (RO122) except for the change of name. Both are among the commoner match stamps, and are apt to be early acquisitions of the M&M collector.

Austin Messinger was born at Norton, Mass. in 1817, and started a small match factory there in 1857. I have searched diligently, but unsuccessfully, for any reference to W. S. Kyle of Boston. His identity, and his relationship, if any, to Messinger, remain a mystery. The private die ordered by Kyle was used by him for only 3 months, from March to June 1865. Beginning in March, 1866, stamps from the Kyle die were delivered to Messinger.

Since by 1866 Messinger had been in the match business for nine years, he was certainly not Kyle's successor. My own supposition is that Kyle started a small factory in or near Boston early in 1865, and for some reason went out of business about 3 months later. His private die was afterwards offered for sale, and purchased by Messinger, who by this time

was doing sufficient business to warrant a private die of his own. It was October, 1875, before Messinger troubled to have the die altered. The name "A. Messinger" was substituted for that of "W. S. Kyle," but the ad-dress was left as "Boston, Mass.", where Messinger maintained a business office, although the factory was still located at Norton. Messinger's name alone appears on the stamp, but the actual firm name was Messinger & Sweet, since Andrew H. Sweet, Messinger's son-in-law, had become a partner in 1873.

By 1880 Sweet seems to have been in control, for it was he who subscribed to the articles of association when the Diamond Match Co. was formed in December of that year. The Norton factory continued in operation for at least 3 years thereafter, presumably under Sweet's management.

The 1765 American Stamp Accounts Marcus Samuel, ARA #860

In addition to the General Account of the Duties, published on pages 22 and 23 of the A. R. A. pamphlet entiled "New Discovery From British Archives on The 1765 Tax Stamps For America," other documents concerning the Duties have been discovered at the Public Record Office in London. This material is British Crown Copyright and has been reproduced by permission of the Controller of Her Britannic Majesty's Stationery Office.

Under reference T.53/50. Treasury Warrants, September 1765 to April 1768.

Page 22. These are to pray and require your Lordship to draw and order for paying out of any supluses, excesses, overplus monies and other revenues composing the fund commonly called the Sinking Fund (except such monies as in said Act are exempted) unto the Commissioners of His Majesty's Stamp Duties or to such person or persons as shall for this purpose be duly authorized by them, the sum of £4947.5s.11d. upon account of defraying the necessary expenses incurred towards carrying into execution an Act passed last Session of Parliament for granting and applying certain Stamp Duties and other Duties in the British Colonies and Plantations in America. And for so doing, etc. Whitehall Treasury Chambers. October 10th. 1765.

Page 17. June 5th. 1766.

Read a letter from Govr. Tryon, dated Brunswick N. Carolina 5th. April 1766, inclosing a copy of the resignation of Mr. Houston, Distributor of Stamps for that Province.

Read a letter from Govr. Pinfold, dated Barbados 24th. February 1766, in answer to Mr. Lowndes of the 14th. September 1765, accuainting My Lords that the Stamp Act had taken place in that Colony.

Read a letter from Govr. Lyttleton,

dated Jamaica 28th. February 1766, in answer to Mr. Lowndes of the 14th. September 1765, acquainting My Lords that the Stamp Act had taken place in that Colony.

Read a letter from Govr. Sharpe, dated Annapolis Maryland 10th. February 1766, in answer to Mr. Lowndes of the 14th. September 1765, acquainting My Lords that the Distributor of Stamps for that Colony had retired some weeks before the Act was to take place, to New York, where he still remains; and that the stamps sent for the use of the Colony are now on board a ship anchored in the Port of Annapolis.

Page 27. June 10th. 1766.

Read a letter from Mr. Freemantle, dated 3rd. May 1766, with an extract of a letter from the Collector of Customs at Brunswick in North Carolina and its enclosures representing the continuance of the resistance to the execution of the Stamp Act in that Province.

Page 65. July 3rd. 1766.

Read a letter from Govr. Grant, St. Augustine, East Florida 26th. April 1766, acknowledging the receipt of the orders of My Lords relative to the Officers of the Stamp Duties and cf the regulations concerning the importation of bullion.

Read a letter from Govr. Wright dated at Savannah in Georgia 1st. May 1766, acknowledging the receipt of the orders sent to him relative to the Stamp Duties.

Read a letter from Govr. Bull, Charles Town May 3rd. 1766, on the same matter and to the same effect.

Read a letter from Mr. C. Lloyd, late Distributor of Stamps in S. Carolina, praying to be appointed Collector of the Customs for Charles Town.

Page 75. July 11th. 1766.

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Read a Memorial of Peter de Lancey, Inspector of Stamps for Quebec, New Hampshire and Nova Scotia, fo: payment of his salary and allowances.

Referred to Commissioners of Stamps.

Page 101. August 4th. 1766.

Read a letter from the Deputy Governor of Barbados, June 20th. 1766, signifying his having received the order for directing the Distributor of Stamps in that Island to return the stamp paper remaining in his custody to England.

Read a report of the Commissioners of Stamps on the Memorial of Peter de Lancey, late Inspector of Stamps for Quebec, New Hampshire and Nova Scotia, praying to be paid his salary from the time he left London.

Prepare a Warrant for allowing his salary from the time he left England to the 7th. of November, the date of his resignation.

Page 127. September 23rd. 1766.

Write to the Commissioners of Stamps to send an account of the produce of the Stamp Duties in the several Provinces of North America and in the Islands.

Read a letter from Sir Henry Moore, Governor of New York, relative to the return of stamps from that Province.

Read a like letter from Francis Farquier, Governor of Virginia.

Read a like letter from Mr. Verchild, Commanding Officer in the Island of St. Christopher.

Read a like letter from Roger Hope Ellerton Esq., Deputy Governor of Jamaica.

Read a letter from Mr. Pitkin relative to the return of stamp parchment and paper remaining in the Colony of Connecticut.

Page 141. 2nd. October 1766.

Read a letter from Mr. Brettell informing My Lords that the Commissioners of Stamps have not as yet been able to get an account of the amount of the stamps disposed of in America and the West India Islands.

Write to the Commissioners of Stamps and desire them to state more specially than they have done in their last letters what orders they have

given, and what steps have been taken in consequence thereof to get in the account of the Stamp Duties that have been collected in the Colonies, and to acquaint them that My Lords observing that they have of late made their representations and answers to My Lords by letter under the hand of their Secretary instead of reports signed by themselves according to the ancient usage of Office, their Lordships are pleased to disapprove of that mode of correspondence and desire them for the future to communicate the business of their Office by reports or representations signed by their Board.

Page 148. October 10th. 1766.

Read Memorial of George Mercer, appointed Distributor of Stamps in the Colony of Virginia, praying My Lords to reimburse him for what he has expended during his employment as Distributor and grant him some recompense for his trouble and loss of time, as he found it impossible to execute his employment further than to secure the stamps from the general and violent opposition which he met with.

Page 160. October 20th. 1766.

Read a letter from Governor Bernard relative to the return of the stamps and stamp parchment to the Commissioners in England.

Page 172. Ocober 28th. 1766.

Read representations from the Commissioners of the Stamps concerning the receipt of the Stamp Duties in America and the West Indies.

Page 176. October 31st. 1766.

Read a letter from Sir Charles Burdett, late Inspector of Stamps at Georgia, praying payment of the bill which he drew upon the Treasury and an additional sum of money for his travelling charges to and from America.

Acquaint Sir Charles Burdett that there is at present no fund out of which My Lords can order payment of the bill which he has drawn upon My Lords or the money which he applies for, for travelling charges.

Read a letter from Govr. Grant dated St. Augustine 8th. September 1766 relative to the return of the stamps and stamp paper to England.

Page 183. November 4th. 1766.

Read a letter from Mr. C. Lloyd, Distributor of Stamps for South Carolina, concerning the return of the stamp paper and parchment.

Page 187. November 7th. 1766.

Read Memorial from Sir Charles Burdett acquainting My Lords that there is a sum of $\pounds 540$ in the hands of the Distributor of Stamps for Georgia, and praying that My Lords will order the amount of the draft he drew upon Their Lordships to be paid out of the money in the hands of the said Distributor.

Prepare a Warrant to the Commissioners of Stamps to pay the amount of the bill drawn upon My Lords by Sir Charles Burdett out of any monies that shall come to their hands on account of the late Stamp Duties collected in the Provinces, subject to their inspection.

Page 206. November 25th. 1766.

Read Memorial of Charles Williamos, late Inspector of Stamps for Montreal & ca., praying My Lords to grant him his salary from the time he left England till his return, being about ten months.

Referred to the Commissioners of Stamps.

Page 221. December 5th. 1766.

Read report of the Commissioners of Stamps on the Memorial of Mr. Williamos, late Inspector of Stamps for Montreal & ca. The Commissioners report that he is entitled to his pay from the 25th. of December 1765 to the 1st. July 1766, and they submit to My Lords whether he does not deserve some further acknowledgement and satisfaction.

Prepare a Warrant for his salary only.

Page 224. December 8th. 1766.

Read Memorial of Mr. Crawford, late Inspector of Stamps for Barbados and Grenada, stating his case to My Lords and praying relief.

Page 236. January 5th. 1767.

Read letter from Govr. Wright, dated Savanna in Georgia 10th. September 1766, relative to the return of the stamp paper to the Commissioners of Stamps in England.

Page 264. January 30th. 1767.

Read letter from Govr. Wright, dated Savannah in Georgia 10th. October 1766, relative to the return of the stamps and stamp paper to the Commissioners in England.

Read letter from Govr. Shirley relative to the return of the stamp paper and parchment from the Bahama Islands to the Commissioners in England.

Page 271. February 6th. 1767.

Read letter from Governor Franklin, dated Burlington 18th. August 1766, relative to the return of the stamp paper to the Commissioners of Stamps in England.

Page 350. April 10th. 1767.

Read Memorial of George Meserve, late Distributor of Stamps for New Hampshire, praying a recompense for his services.

Page 428. July 15th. 1767.

Read Representation from the Commissioners of Stamps that the office of packer and messenger on the American Duty is now become unnecessary and proposing to discharge him.

Agreed to.

Read Memorial of George Meserve, late Distributor of Stamps for New Hampshire.

It was not until the end of 1774 that the American Stamp Accounts were finally closed. There are two documents at the Public Record Office concerning the winding-up or "Declaration" of the Account.

Under reference A.O.1./2192/207, a ledger inscribed "The Declaration of the General Account of the Several Duties Arising on Stampt Vellum, Parchment and Paper in the British Colonies and Plantations in America in the Year 1765."

The accounts in this ledger are set out on four pages. They were exhibited by Morgan Vane, Controller and Accountant General of the Duties, on 23rd. December 1774.

Page 1. This is occupied exclusively by the preliminary statement.

Pages 2 and 3. These concern the "Charge" and the "Discharge" of the account, these terms applying respec-

Under the heading "Arrears due from sundry Distributors in goods, money or bonds" there follows a list of the American Distributors of Stamps with their Districts and the balances still owing from them, as given in the first, second and last columns of the table printed on page 22 the A. R. A.'s Stamp Act pamphlet, the total at the foot of the last column being the outstanding debit balance as above. "And so this General Account of the money arising by the Duties on Stamped vellum, parchment and paper in America is Even and Quit."

WHAT PRICE REVENUES? E. Everett Harrison, ARA #940

The last general catalogue of revenues is fifty years old and hard to come by, but Forbins can still be followed as a guide. I asked the title question of two of the top A. R. A. officers a couple of years ago and they thought that converting Forbins into dollars and cents at a 23c rate would be about right.

Using this as a guide, I put a \$200 price on an Austrian collection that went about \$400 by Forbins and it was a quick sale. That is a better return than on my British Colonial collection in four Scott Albums.

Its catalogue value was \$2,300 in 1963 and after several attempts, I netted \$1200 for it plus several other items including a roll of three sheets of Farleys.

In U. S. items, some nice ones cataloguing \$345 brought \$115 and another lot of about \$4000 catalogue value brought just \$1000.

I have collected and accumulated all my life with the idea that I would have something to fool with when I retired. Now that I am retired, I am not interested but I still have plenty to fool with to get what I have in shape to sell.

I still have a cabinet full of Revenue albums and I think they will do much better than my British and U. S. I showed one of my British Embossed Deed albums to a big New York dealer and he had never seen one before.

U. S. FIRST PROVISIONAL ISSUE Homer C. Landis, ARA #77

Many other business firms and individuals were unable to get stamps the first few weeks the law was in effect. One of these was Captain L. H. Chapman of the Chapman Steamboat Line operating the "Victor Adams" on the Erie Barge Canal. An interesting account of his overprinting Trans-Mississippi stamps, "I. R." and his initials was written by Henry Tolman, ARA #25, and published in the May-June 1948 issue of The American Revenuer.

Another unlisted private provisional consists of the 2c carmine stamp being press overprinted "I. R." in black, almost identical with the government stamp, #R155, except that the letters are smaller. All these stamps seen were used by one company and were manuscript cancelled "W & A" and the date. The dates found were in July, August and September 1898. These are reported to have been found by C. S. Ernst, years ago, who could not remember where they had originated.

In our collection there are several examples of the 1c green and 2c carmine postage stamps of the 1898 issue unquestionably used for revenue purposes. Some of the stamps are cancelled "I. R." and the date, others, "I. R.", initials and the date, all in manuscript. The ones used early in July were probably used because no provisionals were available. The ones used as late as 8-20 and 11-4 could have been used because no revenue stamps were handy. There were probably thousands of these, similarly used stamps, thrown away even by collectors because they are not very attractive items, written across the face with pen or indelible pencil.

Some unusual documents are found bearing the provisionals. We have a check for \$10687.76 signed by Tracy S. Lewis, Treas., Goodyear's M. R. Shoe Co., payable to N. Y. N. H. and H. RR Co., dated June 30, 1898, the day before the law went into effect. It bears the 2c carmine postage stamp pen cancelled GMRSCo 7-1-98. Another one is a check signed by Lucre-

tia R. Garfield, at that time a widow of the President, for \$25.00, payable to George Bellamy, head of Hiram House, a meeting place in Cleveland for underprivileged children. The check is dated July 1, 1898, the day the law requiring use of revenue stamps went into effect. Perhaps Mrs. Garfield did not have a supply of revenue stamps as the check carries a #R155, pen cancelled G. B. 7-5, the day it was deposited.

Stamps #R153, #R154 and #R155 are found on cover used as postage generally without postage due, #R155 is probably the most common used as postage.

NEW JERSEY TROUT STAMPS

Collectors may obtain the seventh issue (1959) of the New Jersey Trout Fishing stamps. There are two denominations, a \$1 black on yellow stamp for resident fishermen and a \$5 brown on white stamp for non-resident fishermen.

A set of two stamps may be purchased for 50c, the two stamps in blocks of four for \$2.00 and a pair of full sheets of ten for \$5.00.
