V. R. POWELL Bruce Miller, ARA #732

Van Renselaer Powell (?-1892) was manufacturing his Telegraph Matches at Troy, New York, as early as 1859. In 1869 he sold out to Bogardus & Griswold, consisting of J. M. Bogardus and (possibly) John A. Griswold. By the following year Griswold had dropped out and Bogardus remained as sole proprietor until sometime in 1875, when he was succeeded by M. C. Miller. The latter, who apparently did business as the Atlantic Match Company, operated the factory for only a short time, since no stamps were issued after July 1875.

The blue 1c adhesive for "V. R. Powell's Telegraph Matches" (RO148) is quite common and features a conventional profile portrait of George Washington after Houdon's wellknown bust. However, Mr. Powell also made use of wrappers, and these are not only very scarce, but remain an enigma as regards their exact dates of issue, quantities issued and manner of use. The die for Powell's wrapper was approved May 6, 1865, and they were surface-printed by the American Phototype Company of New York. This firm, later located at Holyoke, Mass., also produced the early wrappers of Byam, Carlton & Company and John J. Macklin's rare and whimsical rooster stamp, as well as revenue stamped paper and, during the period 1877-1881, United States postal cards. Butler & Carpenter, who held the contract for printing revenue stamps at the time Powell's wrapper appeared, were convinced that they could not produce "stamped paper" (including wrappers) except at a loss, and consequently were induced to sublet such items to the American Phototype Company.

Like the Macklin stamp (see The American Revenuer, January 1967), the Powell wrapper is hardly a prize-winning artistic creation. The vignette shows two bearded, stovepipe-hatted and frock-coated Victorian dignitaries (who somehow manage to resemble hobos), enveloped in billows of smoke, one seated and puffing a pipe, the

other standing and holding a furiously smoking object which could well be a secret weapon of the Union army. Maybe this sinister pair are Confederate spies?

Two varieties of these wrappers exist. The first, on thin manila tissue paper, is found both cut to shape and as an entire with an overall size of 4x6 inches. The trimmed and entire varieties are assigned separate Scott catalogue numbers (RO149 and RO-150), which seems puzzling since the only distinction between them lies in someone's application of scissors. The uncut version is by far the scareer, and must be classed as a rarity. The second variety, on thicker white tissue (RO 151), exists only cut to shape and it has been suggested that it was actually intended as an adhesive stamp. However, it must be remembered that Powell had been receiving his blue 1c stamp for more than 6 months when these wrappers were issued. Possibly the difference in papers had no particular significance. The white wrapper cut to shape is much scarcer than the cut manila wrapper.

Powell's wrappers are not only an enigma to us, but were an embarassment to him, for on August 18, 1865, the district attorney of Albany County was directed by the 14th District Assessor to bring suit against Powel! for the sale of "unstamped goods." This action was initiated on grounds that Powell's wrapper did not constitute a proper or legal stamp, since no provision was made for its cancellation or destruction after use. The suit was suspended by court order, indicating that either the government's case failed to stand up, or Powell consented to discontinue his use of the wrappers. Since Byam, Carlton & Company made very extensive use of wrappers at this time and thereafter, it is difficult to see why Powell was singled out for such onerous attention. The possibility occurs that if Powell were intimidated into abandoning the wrappers, he may then have cut the supply on hand and used them as adhesives, which would account for the cut to shape varieties. Judging from their scarcity, the wrappers were certainly in use only a short time, probably from May 1865 until sometime the following August.

In closing, I have heard or read somewhere an apocryphal story of a New York farmhouse whose walls were papered with Powell wrappers! Happy hunting, you New Yorkers!

A Listing of "Ship" Cancellations On Civil War Revenue Stamps

Cunard Mail Line

One of the oldest and strongest of the British transatlantic steamship companies. They started service July 4, 1840 with the S. S. Britannia, by way of Halifax and Boston. In 1854, they completed a 500-foot pier on the Jersey side of the Hudson river. Later they moved to the Manhattan side of the river. Edward Cunard, a son of the founder, was sent over early as the American representative of the Company.

Type C5. Black cancel D.C. 22x14mm Type C5a. Blue cancel D.E. 33x23mm Type C5b. Blue cancel D.C. 34x20mm Type C5c. Blue cancel S.E. 40x22mm Type C5d. Blue cancel D.E. 30x23mm

California Steam Navigation Co.

This company was formed in 1854 when fights and cut throat competition between the various ships on the Sacramento river between San Francisco and Sacramento caused the more reasonable ship owners to pool their ships for stock in the new company. Everything went well until the California Pacific R. R. Co. attempted to use their own ships on this run competition bankrupted companies and they were taken over by the Central Pacific R. R. Co. about 1868. (The mis-spelling on the cancel is actually on the stamp.)

Type C6. Blue cancel D.E. 28x22mm

Detroit & St. Clair Rivers Towing Association

A Great Lakes steam tug company which towed sailing vessels between Detroit on Lake Erie and Port Huron on Lake Huron. The record is said to have been held by the tug boat Champion, which towed eleven (11) sailing vessels at one time, the full distance of 70 miles.

Type D1. Blue cancel S.E. 31x23mm Type D1a. Blue cancel D.C. 23x15mm

General Transatlantic Company (French Line)

Napoleon III put forward in 1857 an idea for giving a subsidy for a French fleet for trade between France and the United States, the West Indies and Brazil. The concession passed to the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique in 1861, and they opened the New York service in June 1864.

Type G1. Black cancel S.C. 21mm Type G1-1. As above, but with month and year dating

Type G1a. Gray blue cancel S.E. 28x21mm

Type G1b. Gray blue cancel D.E. 31x24mm

Hudson River Day Line

Commodore Alfred Van Santvoord began the present Hudson River Day Line in 1856, running the Armenia with the Alida. He bought the Daniel Drew in September 1863 and in 1864 added the Chauncey Vibbard. The Albany and New York were added later. The line was between New York and Albany and all runs were by daylight. Type H1. Black cancel D.C. 23x14mm

Hawaiian Packet Line

This line was running between San Francisco and Honolulu, at least in 1864 and 1865. Further data was not found. They had the "bark" Smyrniote, whose captain was H. H. Burditt. Their other two ships were the Onward and the A. A. Eldridge, about which I find no data. The San Francisco Agents were Charles W. Brooks & Co. and the Honolulu Agents were Aldrich, Walker & Co.

Type H2. Red cancel Straight line 39x6mm

Hartford & New York Steamboat Co.

This company was organized in 1841, to succeed the Connecticut River

Steamboat Co., with \$100,000 capital. They were owners of the S. S. City of Hartford, 1306 tons. In 1865 they commissioned the building of the steamboat to be named the Vermont, but the name was changed and the ship christened the State of New York, the largest and most costly steamer to run the Connecticut river, 1417 tons, and cost \$200,000.

Inman Line

This was a Scottish steamship company. The maiden voyage was made by the S. S. Glasgow, Dec. 11, 1850. The terminus at that time was Philadelphia, but in 1857 they shifted it to New York. In 1857 there were three sailings each fortnight and in 1866 their ships ran twice a week in the busy season and three times each fortnight in winter.

Type Il. Black cancel D.C. 23x14mm

Lorillard's Steamship Line

This data is from the "History of American Steam Navigation," by John H. Morrison, page 514-15. "In 1867 Lorillard's freight line was established by the outside route from Philadelphia to New York, and was run for several years, but it subsequently came under the control of the Clyde interests."

Type L1. Blue cancel S.C. 33mm

Liverpool & Great Western Steamship Co.

The above is the corporate name but it is commonly known as the Guion Line. It was started by Messrs. Williams and Guion, who had been furnishing emigrants arrangements for the Cunard and National Lines since 1863. Mr. Williams managed the business in New York and Mr. Guion the shipping business in Liverpool. One of their steamers was named the "Idaho."

Type L2. Black cancel D.E. 29x23mm

Merchants' Steamship Co. of Bristol R. I.

This company was formed by a consolidation of the Old Stonington Line and the Neptune S. S. Co. Charter was obtained from the State of Rhode Island in May 1865 and capitalized at \$175,000. This company had bad luck, losing three of their ships in one year, and thus went into bankruptcy in December 1866. Two magnificent new steamers, the Bristol and the Providence, costing \$1,500,000 were sold for \$350,000.

Type M1. Red cancel D.C.

22x13.5mm (1965 dates) Black cancel D.C. 22x13.5mm (1866 dates)

Type M1a. Manuscript cancel 3 lines vertically (1866)

Montreal Ocean Steamship Co.

Hugh Allan of the Allan Line offered to take over the Canadian mail service to England and the above company was formed about 1854 with the aid of Montreal capitalists. This was a fortnightly service to the St. Lawrence river ports in summer and a monthly service to Portland, Maine in winter. The mail then went by train to Montreal from there.

Type M2. Black cancel D.C. 23x14mm

Merchants' & Miners' Transportation Co.

Incorporated by the Maryland General Assembly, Apr. 24, 1852 for a term of 25 years. Charter transferred to others, promoting a steamship service connecting Baltimore and Boston. In 1854 Boston interests subscribed \$80,000, and Baltimore, \$120,000. First trip left Boston, Dec. 28, 1854. It was built up again after the Civil War and became very successful for many years. (Eric Eeyl's book "Early American Steamships" mentions the S. S. George Appold as being owned by the above company from 1864 to 1889. The S. S. Kennedy is not mentioned, but the cancel is similar.)




THE DEALER NAMES APPEARING ON THE TOBACCO TAX STAMPS OF EGYPT

Peter R. Feltus, ARA #1061

As is known to all collectors who have some, nearly every early Egyptian Tobacco Tax Stamp bears the name of a tobacco dealer in the space provided at the bottom of the stamp. As a part of my study of all Egyptian revenue stamps. I have attempted to make a complete listing of these dealers' names. In doing so, I have looked at thousands of these stamps, as have several other collectors whose findings are incorporated in this list. Should any reader be able to supply additions to this list, I would be most pleased to hear from him.

As can be readily seen, the list is in two parts. The first lists the names that appear on stamps of the "Small" Issue and the second lists the names that appear on the "Large" Issue. For details about these issues, see my article "The Revenue and Fiscal Stamps of Egypt" which appeared in The American Revenuer, Vol. 19, #'s 9 and 10 (Nov. and Dec. 1965).
