The ARA has not met in the west since 1986, when we met at ARIPEX in Phoenix. We were scheduled to meet in California last year, but the show was canceled and we had to find another site. Our schedule was re-arranged a bit so that we could get to the west coast, although a year later.

#### **ARA Auction Rules**

These rules apply to the ARA auction in this issue.

- 1. Only ARA members in good standing are eligible to participate in the auction.
- 2. The Auction Manager reserves the right to reject any bids which in his judgement are unrealistic.
- 3. Bids should be in even dollar amounts only. All lots sold to the highest bidder at a slight advance over the next higher bid. A 10% buyers premium will be added to all successful bids. Bidding increments are as follows:

\$5 to \$29 by \$1 \$30 to \$68 by \$2 \$70 to \$195 by \$5

\$200 and overby 5% over next higher bid

- 4. If only one bid is received for a lot it shall be sold at the amount bid or the catalog or estimated value, whichever is lower.
- 5. Buy bids or bids under \$5 will not be accepted.
- 6. Bids must be submitted on the bid sheet accompanying these rules or a reproduction or facsimile therof. No bids will be entered after the closing date. In the case of tie bids, the earliest postmark will be considered the winner.
- 7. In the descriptions a hyphen between two numbers (e.g.: R214-222) indicates that these numbers (inclusive) are included. A slash (e.g.: R214/R222) means that all numbers are not included.
- 8. Lots not properly described must be returned within 10 days. Lots described as defective or as having faults cannot be returned because of such defects or faults.
- Lots sold"AS IS" have not been counted or appraised by the Auction Manager and are not returnable. Bid accordingly.
- 10. If similar lots are listed and ;you are interested in only one of them enter "OR" between the lot
- 11. An invoice will be sent each winning bidder and lots will be forwarded upon receipt of full payment. Payment is due within 10 days of the receipt of the lots. Postage, handling and insurance will be billed to the buyer, \$1.50 minimum.
- 12. Make all checks payable to "The American Revenue Association."
- 13. The placing of any bid constitutes acceptance of the foregoing rules. Prices realized will be published as soon as possible after the sale.

- 14. A 10% commission will be deducted from the final bid price when payment is made to the seller. The ARA auctions will be held without reserves. Consignors may bid on their own material and if the consignor buys back his own lot he will be charged only a 10% seller's commission and for the postage and insurance costs to return the lot.

### **CA Redemption Value Stickers and Imprints**

California, along with several other states, has in recent years adopted a so-called "recycling law." This law requires a mandatory deposit on plastic and aluminum beverage containers for soft drinks and beer. Collected at the time of sale, this deposit is refundable only when the empty container is returned either to the point of sale or to a designated recycling facility.

The purpose of this deposit/redemption requirement is, of course, to reduce litter on roadsides, beaches, parks and other public places. (I'll confess that I haven't noticed any big improvement here in California since the law was passed, but perhaps with time I will.)

The law requires that the phrase "CA REDEMP-




TION VALUE" appear on eligible containers, either included in the label, or affixed as a sticker. One of these stickers is illustrated here.

None of the imprints or stickers that I have seen so far expresses a

denomination. Currently, the scale of redemption value is  $2\phi$  for containers under 24 ounces, and  $4\phi$  for containers 24 ounces or larger.

These stickers and imprints qualify as "fiscals" in two senses: they are mandated by law, and they carry an indication of value, albeit non-denominated.

And what the heck, here in sunny California you can chug-a-lug a sixpack and acquire six nice state fiscals for your collection!

### India

### Airport Tax

#### by A.M. Mollah, ARA

Further to the notes published in these pages on the airport tax stamp of India (1989; 43:197), I am happy to report that the expected RS. 300 denomination has come into use recently. This value was issued to meet the revised tax of Rs. 300 per international passenger. Prior to the last government budget, this tax was Rs. 100. As reported last October, the RS. 300 tax was being collected by using strips of three Rs. 100 stamps.

The new stamp, illustrated here, is smaller in size. The stamp is printed in black with a background in pale green on the passenger segment of the stamp. In my earlier note, I stated that the complete stamp was divided into two halves. This is in error; the stamp is divided into three segments. The left-hand portion is kept by the clerk making the sale, the middle portion



is attached to the ticket jacket of the passenger, and the right-hand portion is attached to the coupon taken out by the airline upon boarding. There are five stamps per pane and several panes are bound together to form a book.

### \$15 Mortgage Milky Blue Revisited

Here is a deed for sale of the Bruxton Manufacturing Company of York, Maine, for \$30,000 on January 25, 1867. The \$30 stamp tax was paid with two copies of the \$15 Mortgage, one in the normal dark blue and the other in the Scott-listed milky blue. Both are canceled "1867 Jany 25 WBH" in the hand of company Treasurer William B. Hall. It seems appropriate and fortunate that no other stamps were required, for their presence could only have detracted from the striking contrast between these two.

The probability of finding both these stamps on a single document is truly infinitesimal. Even in its normal shade, the \$15 Mortgage is rare on document. This was impressed on me early in my collecting days, when I was fortunate enough to do some trading with the late George Turner. His collection was overflowing with expendable pieces I would have loved to swap for, but I was hard pressed to come up with much of significance for him until we realized that

George, despite having enthusiastically collected revenue-stamped documents for about forty years, had none bearing the \$15 Mortgage, while I had been lucky enough to find two. This lead to a trade for some pieces that are still among my favorites. One does not easily forget such an occurrence, and since then I have

been careful to record the particulars of every document seen or heard of that bore this stamp. After fifteen years of intensive searching I can cite only seven examples with the perforated \$15 in its normal shade (also three with the imperf, and on with an ultramarine). The document at had is the only one I have recorded bearing the \$15 milky blue, and the simultaneous presence of a \$15 dark blue is nothing less than a statistical miracle. Like the "Consul Klep" cover (bearing USA 1851 5¢ margin strip of three) or the "Pack strip" (of Brazil 1843 se-tenant 30 reis and 60 reis), this piece deserves to be celebrated with a distinctive name. My favorite is "the Blues Brothers," but since that seems to trendy, I propose "the Blue Boys," with apologies to Gainsborough.

### What color is the \$15 Milky Blue?

This question is posed with tongue only slightly in cheek. Until this document piqued my interest, I knew nothing about the \$15 Mortgage milky blue except its listing by Scott, and began this investigation with a healthy skepticism as to whether the stamp on this piece was a true milky blue. However, several experienced dealers assured me that it must be, even without seeing it. Their argument was that

the \$15 Mortgage can be found in only three shades—dark blue, ultramarine and the so-called milky blue—all quite distinct with very little variation, and with virtually no possibility of mistaking one for another. The dark blue and ultramarine are unmistakable, so by process of elimination, to paraphrase one of these expert observers, "if you think it's a milky blue, it is." Moreover, all agreed that the color name milky blue was somewhat off the mark.

Describing colors is notoriously difficult, but in view of the complete lack of information in the literature on this stamp, an attempt at describing it seems justified. For this I have used four different systems of color identification, in order of their accessibility to philatelists. The first was the Stanley Gibbons Stamp Colour Key, which consists of 205 color samples. To my eye, the one most closely matching the \$15 Mortgage milky blue is *Turquoise-Blue*. The agreement would be improved with a bit less green and a bit more blue, but this match nicely illustrates the important fact that there is a strong component of green in the color of this stamp. For this and all other color comparisons, I used the area where the stamp color is purest, within the lettering panels.

I also utilized the Collectors Institute Color Handbook (1978), whose scheme of color classification is borrowed from the color printing industry, and based on the fact that any color can be reproduced with only four transparent overlays, in yellow, magenta, cyan (a bright blue) and black, with the intensity of each varied from 0% to 100% as required. Incidentally, I have seen this process applied in the production of stamp auction catalogs, and can vouch for its accuracy. In The Color Handbook, each color is identified by a string of four numbers separated by periods, specifying the intensities of yellow, magenta, cyan and black, respectively. Of the combinations given, I judged the best match with the \$15 milky blue to be 30.20.100.0, i.e. 30% yellow, 20% red and 100% cyan.

One problem with this system is that similar results can be achieved with somewhat dissimilar combinations for example, my second choice was 10.0.100.20. One would prefer that similar colors be clustered together on the four-dimensional matrix of combinations.

A more manageable underlying system is used in the *Methuen Handbook of Color* (third edition), which contains a three-dimensional array of 1266 illustrated colors. To discuss these intelligently, a digression is necessary. The colors are generated as follows: Four *primary hues*—yellow, red, blue and green—are used to generate 30 *hues*. Another way of

### Caveat to Readers!

Do not use these color reproductions as standards with which to compare your stamps! Compare the colors of one reproduction against hat of the others, then compare the colors of your stamps against each other. Color differences between the reproductions should be similar to color differences between actual stamps.

Absolute color accuracy is imposible. The stamps were printed by intalio with inks composed of ground mineral pigments. These reproductions are four color offset halftones that simulate different colors by mixing yellow, megenta, cyan and black.

The separations for these color pictures were made from the original documents in one shot. Proofs indicate that the milky blue and ultramarine blue arequite close while the normal ultramarines are a little yellowish.

expressing this is that a color circle is created which changes from yellow to red, to blue, to green, and back to yellow, in 30 steps. Incidentally, 19 of these are named, although this is not essential to the classification system. Each of the four primary hues encompasses from two to four unnamed sub-hues, and the others have mostly simple compound names such as greenish yellow, yellowish green, and the like. Each of these 30 hues is then used to generate a two-dimensional matrix of 48 colors, of varying intensity and tone. Each color sample is composed of dots of the pure hue, and intensity is defined by the area of the sample covered by the dots, from 100% (the pure hue) to 0% (white), in eight steps numbered in reverse order (i.e., from 8 to 1). Tone is varied by overprinting these eight colors with transparent gray inks, six different ranging from white to dark gray and labelled A through F, respectively. Each color is then specified by giving its hue, tone and intensity, for example 2A8, 26G3, and so on.

In addition to the on-document stamp shown above, I was able to borrow four more examples of the \$15 Mortgage milky blue from a friend, and we independently compared them to the Methuen colors. being careful to use the portion of the stamp where the color is purest. There was practically no variation or disagreement among our choices of the color samples most closely matching the stamps, the near-unanimous selection being Methuen 23E7. This match, while quite close, could be improved if a slightly greener hue and a slightly lower intensity were available, or equivalently, by interpolating to (23+) E(6.5). Sample 23E7 is one of dozens, ranging across four hues, to which the handbook assigns the generic name grayish blue, and is at the greenmost end of that spectrum. A bit more green would make it a subshade of turquoise; 24E7, one hue greenward, is names grayish turquoise. The stamp itself does have a somewhat "milky" appearance, but this appears to be due less to the ink color per se than to the fact that it is appreciably lighter in intensity and tone than the normal dark blue (which I see as Methuen 21F8 or 22F8), and to the large amount of white in the design in the form of engine-turned lathework, cross-hatching in the area surrounding the portrait, and so on.

Finally, I used (or attempted to use) the National Bureau of Standards (NBS) treatise, Color (1976), and the accompanying color charts of the ISCC (Inter-Society Color Council)-NBS. These are based on the Munsell system of color designation, which used three variables essentially similar to those of the Methuen handbook described above, but termed hue, saturation and lightness, the last two virtually identical to Methuen intensity and tone. An impressive array of experts cite this as the system of choice, the most scientific and detailed., a veritable Universal Color Language. Unfortunately, the 267 color samples in the ISCC-NBS charts are inadequate for most purposes (including those of this study), and while some excellent Munsell-keyed color arrays do exist, they are all quite expensive. R.H. White's Color in Philately (1978) provides a compromise, offering 604 color samples, but regrettably it is poorly suited to philatelic use, especially for stamps on document or cover. It should be obvious that the layout of any such color samples ought to allow them to be overlapped or abutted directly against the items for which a match is sought, with no border area intervening. For example, in the Gibbons color key and the Collectors Institute handbook, this is accomplished by circular holes cut in each sample. With the Methuen handbook, I was willing to cut pages from the book, and to cut away portions of the white borders adjoining the relevant samples.

By now the reader is presumably aware of the

difficulties in describing a color with mere words, but hopefully has a reasonable impression of the appearance of the \$15 Mortgage milky blue.

### A Truer Milky Blue

There are a number of First Issue shades which appear to be more deserving of the name milky blue than the stamp we have been discussing. To my eye, the best choice would have been the typical shade of the 10¢ Proprietary. The Boston Book called this pale blue, and also lists a dull blue, which is itself quite "milky." Others have different choices. This was made clear to me by a friend who shall remain nameless, an eminently rational, skeptical and somewhat cynical long-time observer of the philatelic scene, who happens to own the reference collection of the late Robert Leard, a dedicated student of the First Issue for many years. In that collection was a page devoted to the 50¢ Conveyance ultramarine, and on it a stamp very different from the other, beneath which Leard had written "Milky Blue." I had to agree that one's preconception of that color was better satisfied by this stamp than by the \$15 shade discussed above, this one being a rich, pleasing pastel blue. My friend went further, proposing that Leard had used the term advisedly and that the \$15 Mortgage must exist in the same shade, and challenging me to prove otherwise. Now except for objects larger than, say, a small skyscraper and not easily overlooked, it is risky to claim on the basis of simple induction that something does not exist. Consider Bigfoot and the Abominable Snowman; one never knows when a counter example might appear. Nevertheless, I am confident my friend is wrong. After seeing his 50¢ stamp, I searched my collection and found two examples of it on document. I feel sure this is the so-called 50¢ Conveyance ultramarine blue listed by the Boston Book. It was commented on in "The Revenue Unit Column" of The American Philatelist in 1929 as follows: "He also sends a pair of the 50¢ Conveyance stamp in a milky sky blue color printed on soft thick paper. This is not the regular ultramarine color that the stamp usually appeared in. Most of you are familiar with this peculiar shade, it occurred only on a rather thick 'blotting paper' and appeared—from all the cancellations we have seen—in the early part of 1870." Leard's stamp bore a manuscript cancel dated February 26, 1870, and my two on document were dated November 24, 1869, and March 2, 1870; the former was used on an entry of goods document in Philadelphia, where the stamps were printed, which helps explain its early date. Another off-document example seen subsequently is dated January 5, 1870. This shade has the light but distinctive hint of purple characteristic of all ultramarines, and was evidently a late printing of the

50¢ Conveyance ultramarine. Its markedly richer hue, as compared with the rather pale and washedout-looking appearance of the more common printing(s) of this stamp, was probably intentional on the part of Butler and Carpenter. According to the Boston Book, their letter of September 27, 1869, to Acting Commissioner Douglass states in regard to the ultramarines, "We have been arrangements...to deepen the shade...." In any case, there can be little argument that the most appropriate name for this shade is not milky blue, milky sky blue, or anything else but ultramarine blue, both because of the historical precedent set by the Boston Book, and more importantly, because of the specific connotation of the term ultramarine in fiscal philately.

By now it should be clear that the \$15 Mortgage does not exist in the aforementioned shade—or to put it more cautiously, if it does, the editors of the Boston Book had never seen one. If they had, it is a reasonable assumption that they would have listed a \$15 Mortgage ultramarine blue, and we know they did not. Moreover, if one accepts the conclusion that the ultramarine blues were late printings of certain ultramarines, it follows that one would not expect the \$15 Mortgage to exist in ultramarine blue, for the pure ultramarines were presumably so little used that a subsequent printing was never necessary.

I showed four co-workers three documents (two illustrated here) bearing the \$15 Mortgage milky blue, the 50¢ Conveyance ultramarine blue, and the 10¢ Proprietary in its richer shade, and asked them to pick the one best described as milky blue. The consensus was that the 10¢ Proprietary was a clear first choice, followed by the \$15 Mortgage, then the 50¢ Conveyance. As a name for the \$15 shade, one of my friends suggested the delightfully appropriate "murky blue," which strikes me as just about perfect. It nicely evokes the color of the stamp, is certainly catchy, and perhaps best of all, would require Scott to

I note that one other stamp, the 10¢ Contract, is listed by the Boston Book in both ultramarine and ultramarine blue. The copies of this stamp available to me do show a rather wide range of shades, unlike the 2¢ Proprietary, 10¢ Foreign Exchange, 50¢ Surety Bond and \$15 Mortgage ultramarines, which are all quite uniform. These 10¢ Contract variants are certainly consistent with attempts "to deepen the shade," yet none I have seen quite matches the distinctive 50¢ Conveyance under discussion here; moreover, while I was able to convince myself that the 50¢ Conveyance ultramarines could be readily separated into only two discrete shades, the 10¢ Contract ultramarines seemed less cooperative.

change just two letters. Seriously, the description of this \$15 shade as milky blue is probably too well established for a formal change to be appropriate, but in my mind at least, it is already a *fait accompli*: "murky blue" it is!

### When was the \$15 Milky Blue Used?

Thanks to a number of collectors and dealers, I was able to record the cancel dates on thirteen copies of the \$15 milky blue. The earliest was August 30, 1866; the latest, May 6, 1870; and the dates were distributed as follows: 1866 (5), 1867 (2), 1868 (2), 1869 (3), 1870 (1).2 Given the predictably long (shelf life" of \$15 stamps (Mahler, 1988), a reasonable working hypothesis is that a single printing of milky blues was made in mid-1866. This color change, like the one from ultramarine to ultramarine blue discussed above, was probably intentional. The Boston Book states that "...the many shades of pale blue and ultramarine in which several of the stamps occur is not the result of accident, or carelessness in mixing the inks, as has been generally supposed, but...was intentional and done with a definite object." (That object being to thwart attempts to wash and re-use the blue stamps., Except for the case of the ultramarines, the authors present no direct evidence to support their contention, but it seems reasonable to conclude that the archives of Butler and Carpenter (of which the Boston Book presents a sampling and distillation) did contain such evidence.3 There is in fact one other piece of evidence I am aware of that bears on this point, or at least appears to. Scott lists proofs of the \$15 Mortgage in both ultramarine and milky blue. It is difficult to imagine any purpose for striking such proofs except to test and/or record these colors, the die and plates having long since proven satisfactory. Such proofs in milky blue would thus constitute very strong evi-

dence that the change to that color was fully intentional. More important, these proofs would be the best evidence of the true color of the \$15 milky blue. Finding a copy of this Scott-listed proof was thus an important objective in my research for this article. When I finally came face to face with one (or at least with what purported on excellent authority to be one, since it was part of an exhibit awarded an ARA Gold), it proved hugely disappointing. As I recall, its color was a rather dark blue, only slightly lighter than the typical dark blue shade of the \$15 Mortgage, without the prominent components of green and gray of the "murky blue" stamp described above. If what I saw was indeed the Scott-listed "milky blue" proof, it should be immediately de-listed, or have its name changed.

### Why is the \$15 Mortgage Milky Blue Listed by Scott?

The First Issues abound in color varieties, but except for the ultramarines, the \$15 Mortgage milky blue is the only shade accorded a Scott listing.4 It is natural to wonder why, and I can think of some plausible explanations. This is a large, high value, relatively rare stamp, not, say, some piddling 5¢, 10¢ or 50¢ value. The variety is highly noticeable, being one of only three distinct colors in which the basic stamp occurs, unlike, for example some 50¢ shades very similar to the \$15 milky blue which go virtually unnoticed because these stamps exist in a wide range of other shades as well, so that the distinction between shades is blurred, or the \$2.50 Inland Exchange, which also comes in a fine array of colors, but none really strikingly different from its nearest neighbors. Finally, the precedent set by the Boston Book in naming and listing the \$15 milky blue is certainly important, and it seems to me absolutely crucial that the name chosen then was a catchy one. If Toppan, Deats and Holland had called this shade, say, "light greenish blue," it would almost certainly not be listed today by Scott. In support of this argument, consider the \$50 U.S.I.R. The Boston Book lists pale green and dark green shades, which are as unlike each other as the \$15 Mortgage milky blue and dark blue, yet the \$50 is listed in Scott only in green. One cannot help wondering whether a more memorable name would have motivated a separate Scott listing for the \$50 pale green. The situation here is admittedly slightly more complicated than for the \$15, since

the Boston Book lists the \$50 in a total of four shades (the other being blue green and yellow green), but I don't think this materially affects my conjecture.

None of the above is intended to suggest that Scott's listing of the \$15 Mortgage milky blue is not justified. On the contrary, as the document featured here beautifully illustrates, this is a highly noticeable variety that deserves to be recognized. Given the task of picking the single most distinctive First Issue color variety, it would probably be the best choice. Essentially, this is what Scott has done. Considering, though, how much the enjoyment of First Issue philately is heightened by an understanding and appreciation of its color variations, it is only regrettable that a great many more shades are not listed by Scott, just as is done for postage stamps.

As a final word, I would like to thank all the collectors and dealers who have contributed data or observations during the course of this study.

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### Argentina's federal stamp tax

Argentinia continues to use a federal documentary stamp tax with tax required on most documents coming under federal jurisdicition. While they have been in use well over a century, basic questions still arise regarding their use. ARA member David Stivison has submitted a copy of a recent article from *Intaernational Business Lawyer* (1990 January; 18:1) regarding a recent case concerning their useage.

In Argentina it is common practice to include a promissory note along with loan agreements. These promissory notes make available to the creditors easier collection procedures in the event of default by the borrower. For some time there has been the

question if the law requires tax stamps to be affixed to both the loan agreement and the note. On June 6, 1989, the National Commercial Court of Appeals decided in the case Sánchez Gandolfi, Mario v Marano, Tomás J, that having the loan agreement itself paid the tax, it was "absurd and excessive" to requirement the payment of a double tax by having to stamp the promissory notes as well. Thus, the loan transaction was considered as a single instrument for tax purposes, in this instance disregarding the law governing the individual existence of the note and the independence and autonomy given such notes.

### The Check Collector—February 1990

### North Carolina

### **Those Rare Coltrane Stamps**

In North Carolina the Commissioner of Agriculture is elected to four year terms. W. Kerr Scott was well into a popular third term when he died in February 1948, a term that would have expired at the end of 1948 (Cheney, 1975). The governor appointed D.S. Coltrane to fill the office for the remainder of Scott's term. Lou Ballentine was elected to the office in the fall elections and took over in January 1949.

When it comes to revenue stamps in North Carolina, the Commissioner of Agriculture is of prime importance as his signature appears on all the inspection stamps issued by the department of agriculture. These included, at the time, Dog Food, Feed Stuff, Fertilizer, Linseed Oil, Lime, and Vegetable and Flower Seed stamps. Though it is not known for certain, it appears that the decision was made to use the already prepared W. Kerr Scott stamps and to only print new stamps where existing stocks were insufficient to make it until a new commissioner was sworn in. As such, stamps with Coltrane's signature are much rarer than the average yearly issued revenue stamps.

Among the Dog Food stamps only a single two-cent orange variety is known. This is shown in Figure 1 and is DF5 in Hubbard's catalog. Two Feed Stuff stamps have appeared, the orange 5/16¢ and the black 1 1/4¢ stamp. The latter is shown in Figure 2. These are Hubbard catalog numbers F127 and F128.

No Fertilizer or Lime stamps are known with Coltrane's signature, though they may exist. However, a single five-cent black on light blue green paper Linseed Oil stamp is reported in the Hubbard catalog as LO30 under the heading "1970?" It would appear the year should be 1948.

The 1949 Vegetable and Flower Seed stamp is

known with both Coltrane's and Ballentine's signatures. Figure 3 shows the black on light yellow paper stamp with Lou Ballentine's signature.

Coltrane it should be noted, is still an active figure in North Carolina political circles, however, his service since 1949 has been in departments other than the Department of Agriculture. Hopefully, this article will clarify the dates associated with the stamps bearing his signature.
