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
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

## Discovery of J.C. Ayer & Co. Four Cents Blue Die Cut Stamp (RS9) on Experimental Silk Paper

The four cents blue J.C. Ayer & Co. stamp was first issued in April, 1863. In its die cut form it is among the more common private die proprietary medicine stamps, and is well-known on old, silk, and watermarked papers. The stamp has not been described on experimental silk paper, and is not listed in the Scott catalogue as so occurring.

The stamp recently was encountered on paper that had all of the features of experimental silk paper (Figure). It was thereupon sent in consultation to The Philatelic Foundation and was returned with a certificate (number 0151466) concurring with the view that the stamp was genuine, had been used, and was printed on experimental silk paper.

Although the magnificent assemblage of Ayer stamps in the recently sold Joyce collection did not include an RS9 on experimental silk paper, there is little reason to believe that this stamp is unique. Parallelling a previously made statement (Ferry, 1989), a systematic survey of all copies currently regarded as being on old paper would probably turn up additional examples.

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# More Information on Airport Departure Taxes



Airport Departure Taxes have become increasingly popular as a means of increasing tax revenues without hurting the native population. The vast majority of the income comes from foreigners leaving a particular country. The lesser developed countries are major users of this kind of taxation. As will be seen the tax "stamps" vary in sophistication and quality.

In Figure 1 we see the airport departure fee stamp from Zimbabwe. This is a printed stamp in light green. The star and the word Zimbabwe are printed in red, while the eagle is printed in yellow. All other printing is in black. The adhesive is affixed to the boarding pass and is canceled in black ink. Of particular note is the fact it is denominated in U.S. Dollars. In this case ten dollars. What other countries denominate their revenue stamps in the currency of another nation?

The Nauru departure fee *stamp* is really not a stamp, but rather a receipt. The paper is yellow and the printing black (Figure 2). There is a very faint blue cancel over the serial number indicating the Republic of Nauru, departure fee collected. The fee is equal to \$8 in U.S. currency.

The Kiribati boarding fee *stamp* (Figure 3) is similar in nature to the Nauru receipt. It is



printed on salmon color paper in black ink. Where it not canceled, there would be no indication what country issued the stamp, except for the seal. The cancellation is in black ink. The fee was equal to \$4 U.S.

The Singapore tax is called an international passenger service charge. Only one half of the tax stamp is show (Figure 4). Overall the stamp is printed in royal blue on light gray paper, except for the reverse printed items which in its entirety reads, "Not for Sale/At Airport," which is printed in red. The other half is retained at the airport and bears the same serial number. The tax stamps is paid for at the time the ticket is bought. There is a security background which reads Civil Aviation Authority of Singapore.

In Figure 5 we see the fee paid stamp from Brunei.

It is printed black on pale blue, except for the crest which is bright orange. Note that the stamp designates one of two possible destinations, these being Malaysia or Singapore, despite the fact that there is also air traffic to Indonesia as well. The fee in U.S. money is about \$4.

The Philippine passenger terminal fee is printed black on pale yellow paper, with a security background of gray seals (Figure 6). At the time the fee was about \$6 in U.S. currency.

In Figure 7 we see the tax imposed by Vanuatu. It is not a stamp or even a receipt, but rather just two cancellations. How they keep track of the money is difficult to say since the money for the tax simply went into a box with no record made. The boarding pass was stamped in light blue "airport tax paid 1500vt" which





is equal to U.S. \$12. Just before boarding the plane the blue imprint is canceled in black with "seen on departure" and the date. The cancel is in black.




Figure 8 (left); Figure 9 (above)

The Passenger Service Charge from Malaysia is printed in black on pale pink paper (Figure 8). The portion shown was originally attached at the left to a book where the stub had the same serial number as the portion shown. When the tax is paid the date is entered on the stub and initialed. In U.S. dollars the fee was about \$6.

The Fiji airport departure tax is printed in bright

green on a self-adhesive white label. The label is placed on the back of the boarding pass and is canceled in lavender. The fee in U.S. dollars was about \$7. (See Figure 9)

In Figure 10 we see the service charge of Thailand which amounted to U.S. \$8. It is printed black on pale yellow. Like the Malaysia stamp it was attached at the left to a book with a stub. Nothing was written on the stub after the tax was paid, however.

One of the most interesting airport tax stamps is shown in Figure 11. The stamp itself is crude. It is mimeographed poorly on very soft white paper. There is no indication of the country. in fact it was Indonesia. Note that the most important element is the fact that it is a tax on domestic departures. The tax amounted to something less than \$2 U.S.

## A History of Small Boat Numbering

#### by William A. Smiley, ARA Introduction

I have long collected revenue stamps, Scott listed and otherwise. I have always been fascinated by the legal and historical background behind the stamps in my collection. In recent years, my interests have become more general in that I have been collecting all different types of government regulatory documents, licenses, permits and similar items.

For many years I have had the Federal Boating Stamps, RVB1 and RVB2 in my collection. Despite the helpful information about them that appears in *Scott's Specialized Catalogue* I felt there was much more to know about these attractive stamps. Why are used examples so uncommon? Why are the few used ones that turn up canceled in only a handful of states? What are certificates of number? Why were these stamps first issued in 1960? Are they still in use? If not, when where they discontinued? What replaced them?

After researching various sources, I felt I understood the context of these stamps and their relationship to the manner in which boats are presently numbered (or registered) by the States. With the hope that others have an interest in this history I present the following information. If others have anything to add, please write me at Post Office Box 361, Portage, Wisconsin 53901.

#### Act of June 7, 1918

During World War I, Congress approved a law requiring all undocumented vessels operated in whole or in part by machinery, owned in the United States and operated on navigable waters of the United States were required to obtain a certificate of number from the Collector of Customs. The number on the certificate was to be painted to each bow with digits at least three inches high. Excluded from the Act were public vessels and vessels not exceeding 16 feet in length ordinarily propelled by paddles or oars. Effective March 3, 1947, boats equipped with removable outboard motors were not required to be numbered.

At first glance, it may seem that this Act was very wide ranging in effect. This was not the case, however. First, it only applied to undocumented vessels. A documented vessel is one that was required to be licensed by, or to be registered or enrolled with, the Collector of Customs. Most large watercraft and many yachts are documented. Documented watercraft can be identified by the fact they normally bear names rather than numbers.

The second limitation of the 1918 Act was that it only applied to watercraft operated on navigable waters. "Navigable" is a legal term that normally means waters that flow between states or that lead to the sea. As a result, boats operated solely on inland lakes and rivers were exempt from the Act altogether.

In later years the Coast Guard succeeded the Customs Service in issuing certificates of number.

#### The Federal Boating Act of 1958

By 1957, Congress reacted to the proliferation of watercraft used for recreational purposes by holding hearings and working with representatives of state

governments and the boating industry on a new law. There was concern that the Coast Guard was too shorthanded to adequately enforce existing safety

regulations on navigable waters. Federal law was interpreted to forbid state governments from enacting safety regulations applicable to navigable waters. These state agencies were also barred from acting for the Coast Guard in enforcing federal law on these waters. Conversely, the federal government had no jurisdiction over inland waters and could not compel the numbering or registration of boats that were used only on inland lakes or rivers which were not considered navigable under federal law. In addition, the federal government did not have the authority to prescribe safety regulations with respect to these inland waters. Finally, there was a concern that state boating laws should be uniform from state to state so that boat owners would not be confused by conflicting state laws.

The Boating Act of 1958 required most undocumented vessels operating on navigable waters propelled by machinery of more than 10 horsepower to obtain certificates of number from the Coast Guard after April 1, 1960. As result, the basic approach of the Act of June 7, 1918, was continued.

However, the 1958 Act included a major departure from previous law. Any state that enacted a system of

numbering watercraft prior to April 1, 1960, which was approved by the Coast Guard, was entitled to assume the duty of numbering boats used on any waters of that state, including navigable waters. The states were also allowed to number or register boats of less than 10 horsepower or that had no motor. In addition, each state with an approved numbering system was granted explicit authority to make and enforce safety regulations on all touching the state or within the state.

By April 1, 1960, 28 states had enacted numbering statutes that received federal approval. Ten more were on the verge of enacting boating statutes acceptable to the Coast Guard. These states received waivers from the Coast Guard and no watercraft in them were numbered by the Coast Guard since each of them passed federal approved laws before their waivers expired.

The Coast Guard began numbering of boats in the remaining 12 states and the District of Columbia on April 1, 1960. These states were Alaska, Connecticut, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Maine, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Washington and Wyoming. Coast Guard numbering in these jurisdictions ended when they passed federally approved boating laws. The laws were approved by the following states in the following years: Iowa and Idaho 1961, Connecticut and New Jersey 1962, Wyoming 1968, Maine and Pennsylvania 1964, Tennessee 1965, Hawaii 1966, District of Columbia 1975. Washington state 1984 and New Hampshire 1988.





Illustration for publicity purposes of \$3 federal boating stamp.

The Coast Guard continues to number boats Alaska. In 1961 the 1958 Act was extended to Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Guam. In later years it was also extended to American Samoa. All of these jurisdictions now have their own approved numbering systems.

#### Federal Boating Stamps

Starting in 1960, the manner in which a boat was numbered by the Coast Guard was for the applicant to obtain a two part form called CG-3876 and CG-3876-A. All first and second class post offices throughout the United States, at all designated third and fourth class post offices in states in which undocumented vessels were numbered by the Coast Guard and at all Coast Guard Marine Inspection offices.

Upon competing the form, a \$3 federal boating stamp (RVB2) or "special fee stamp" as it was described in Coast Guard literature was to be purchased. The pictoral portion was to be affixed to CG-3876A while the stub was affixed to CG-3876 and

both were to be postally canceled. The boat owner kept the validated CG-3876A which permitted operation of the motorboat without numbers for up to sixty days from the date of the cancellation pending receipt of the wallet size certificate of number and the affixation of numbers to the vessel. The other portion (CG-3876) of the application, with the stub of the federal boating stamp affixed, was forwarded by the Post Office to the Coast Guard. The Coast Guard, in turn, issued the certificate of number.

The forms for applying for a duplicate certificate of number to replace one that was lost or destroyed were designated forms CG-3919 and CG-3919A. It was to be validated by the \$1 federal boating stamp (RVB1) in the same manner as the \$3 stamp validated the original application for number. Applications for a duplicate certificate number were available at the same locations as the application for number.

The use of federal boating stamps was discontinued on January 31, 1964. Thereafter, applications for numbers were forwarded to the Coast Guard and temporary certificates were apparently validated by a rubber stamp.

Used \$1 and \$3 federal boating stamps, on or off temporary certificate are uncommon. This is probably due to a number of factors Most were probably discarded when the certificate of number was received from the Coast Guard. The requirement that the temporary certificates be on board to be carried on the vessel at all times it was in use probably resulted in many being damaged Further, since the Coast Guard numbered boats in only a handful of states, and since four of them adopted their own numbering systems before the stamps were discontinued, their use was not very widespread. Fewer than 10% of all boats numbered in the United States in the early

1960s were numbered by the Coast Guard. The rest received numbers from the state in which the boats were primarily used. Finally, the fact that the stamps were in use for only 46 months is also a factor in their scarcity. The sale of the stamps prior to April 1, 1960, was forbidden and their use was discontinued on January 31, 1964.

#### The Federal Boat Safety Act of 1971

The Federal Boating Act of 1958 was repealed and replaced on August 10, 1971, by the Federal Boat Safety Act of 1971. The new enactment continued most of the 1958 Act's requirements as to the numbering of watercraft, except the coverage was expanded to include more watercraft. Under the new law, all mechanically propelled vessels operating in states where the Coast Guard was responsible for numbering were required to be numbered. Under the 1958 Act, only watercraft propelled by motors of over 10 horsepower operating on navigable waters were required to be numbered.

### Federal Regulations Affecting State Watercraft Numbering

Since 1958, the Coast Guard issued a series of regulations which established the framework for state numbering systems.

The Coast Guard regulations assigned each state a two letter abbreviation which comprises the first two digits of the boat number. All boat numbers in the United States include the following abbreviations for the following states:



Validation sticker issued by the Coast Guard for use in Alaska.



At first, most states issued only certificates of number which informed the owner of the number that was to be placed on each side of the bow of the boat. In later years, most if not all jurisdictions began issuing validation stickers to be affixed to each side of the bow to show that the boat was currently registered.

Effective September 1, 1970, the Coast Guard also began issuing validation stickers which were required to be displayed on each side of the boat within six inches of the number. At the same time, the federal numbering fee was increased from \$3 to \$6 for a term of three years.

The Coast Guard also amended its regulations to make uniform requirements with respect to stateissued validation stickers. The regulations provided that if a state issued stickers, they were to comply with the following: a, the stickers were to be approximately 3 inches square; b, the stickers were to be



displayed within 6 inches of the number; c, the year in which the stickers expired was to be indicated by the colors blue, international orange, green and red, in rotation, beginning with blue for stickers that expired in 1973. The stickers issued by the Coast Guard follow the same rotating scheme. The required colors for stickers expiring from 1973 to 1992 are as follows: blue—1973, 1977, 1981, 1985, 1989; orange—1974, 1978, 1982, 1986, 1990; green—1975, 1979, 1983, 1987, 1991; red—1976, 1980, 1984, 1988, 1992.

#### Conclusion


The boating stamps represent a part of a federal effort to encourage state to register and regulate motorboats. The 1958 and 1971 Acts were highly successful in obtaining this goal as evidenced by the

fact that each of the states, commonwealths and territories of the United States, except Alaska, have adopted their own systems of boat registration and boating regulation and most, if not all, have strong enforcement efforts on all waters touching each respective jurisdiction.

## Libyan revenues to British Library

A collection of Lybyan revenue stamps issued between 1955 and 1969 has been given to the British Library. This collection comprises material formerly in the archive of the security printer Bradbury Wilkinson. It has been presented by John Davies of the British Library Philatelic Collections. The Davies Collection comprises horizontal strips of five taken from the imprimatur sheets of all printings which have been annotated with order numbers.

John Davies has been collecting stamps for over fifty years. He specializes in Italy and its former colonies, which continue to be his main interest. Selected items from this collection will be on display in the British Library Exhibition Galleries in July.

The British Library is one of the world's great research centers. Its philatelic collections are the National Philatelic Collections of the United Kingdom. The Davies Collection joins the Library's already extensive holdings of revenue stamps which include the Board of Inland Revenue Stamping Department Archive, the HMSO Collection and the Kay Collection of British Colonial Revenue Stamps to the end of the 1930s. ## 2¢ Third Issue Color Error

## Claret or Vermilion?

The earliest mention of the 2¢ Third Issue color error that I am aware of is in the Boston Revenue Book, which states as an addendum that:

"We have been shown a copy of this stamp with the frame printed in claret instead of orange. The color is pure, very even, and exactly matches the deeper shades used for the frame of the one cent value.

"While there is, of course, a chance that the color has been altered in some way there is very little likelihood that such is the case and, in our opinion, the stamp is one of a sheet which, by mistake, was printed in the color of the one cent vale."

The earliest Scott Specialized catalog to include the Third Issue revenues was the 1929 edition, which listed the 2¢ color error in claret, unpriced. By 1933 a value of \$125 had been set, in italics to show uncertainty due to infrequent transactions. By comparison, the \$2 Probate of Will imperforate was then \$150, the \$3.50 Inland Exchange imperforate was \$125, as was the \$200 USIR imperforate and the 2¢ Third Issue invert was just \$7.

Jumping ahead to the 1956 Specialized, the 2¢ Third Issue color error was still listed as claret and black, with its price now only \$70, but again in italics. (By comparison the invert had risen to \$22.50.) By 1972, the color given for the color error was still claret, and the price still in italics. In my next Scott Specialized, though, which is the 1984 edition, the 2¢ Third Issue color error is no longer listed in claret, but in vermilion. Its price of \$400 (once more in italics) was now only 60% more than that of the 2¢ invert at \$250.

This is quite a change, from a claret stamp priced at 18 times that of the invert, to a vermilion one priced at 1.6 times the invert! I mention it primarily because I have never seen a convincing copy of the 2¢ Third Issue in vermilion. Even the few copies I have seen

with certificates seemed to be a different shade than the acknowledged Third Issue vermilions, the \$2 and \$5. I will be the first to admit, though, that I am not an expert in this area.

Since the change in the Scott listing from the established claret color (that of the 1¢) to a vermilion (which may or may not be that of the \$2 and \$5) was made within recent memory, some time between 1972 and 1984, hopefully the responsible parties are available to explain the situation. Was the 2¢ claret and black a figment of the imagination as the current Scott listing implies? Is a 2¢ in the vermilion of the \$2 and \$5 Third Issue also imaginary? Do the old "claret" and current "vermilion" listings actually describe the same shade, which is neither claret nor vermilion in the sense of the accepted Third Issue colors? This last seems inconsistent with the passage quoted above from the Boston Book. Does the stamp exist in a true claret and black, but is it so rare that current editors and experts have never seen one? What has happened to the discovery copy described in the Boston Book?

Until someone proves otherwise, the skeptic's course is to believe there is no such thing as a 2¢ Third Issue color error, the so-called vermilions being nothing but variants of the normal orange, and the so-called claret described in the Boston Book not known to exist today. How about it experts?
