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Affixing of Jayne private die stamps by druggists before October 1, 1863

In an outstanding article published in the April, 1993 issue of The American Revenuer, Michael Mahler delineated in magisterial detail the manner in which private die revenue stamps were delivered to the manufacturers of proprietary medicines (Mahler, 1993). Many of us have taken it for granted that once delivered to the manufacturers, the stamps were then applied by the firms' staff members to the packaged proprietary medicines before the latter were shipped to wholesale and retail druggists for sale to the public.

Dr. Mahler's article reminded me of a related matter that had attracted my attention several years ago when I purchased in a nonphilatelic auction a small lot of documents pertaining to the activities of Daniel R. Spaulding, who was in the drug business in Richmond, New Hampshire.

The document of greatest interest is illustrated in Figures 1A and 1B. It indicates that the Jayne company was shipping its private die stamps from Philadelphia to New Hamp-

shire, where they were to be applied to unstamped medicines by an individual in the drug business. The second key point of interest is the detailed information provided about just which of the Jayne stamps were to be applied to each of the firm's various proprietaries, and the precise manner in which they were to be affixed.

The Jayne company's private die stamps were issued in three denominations: the 1¢ blue, the 2¢ black and the 4¢ green. Each of these occurs in varieties well-known to collectors of match and medicine stamps. The 4¢ green, die cut stamp (RS149a) is illustrated in Figure 2.

In the summer of 1863, the Jayne company had written to Spaulding, asking him to submit a list of their medications that he had on hand, but which did not bear revenue stamps. After receiving his response, the Jayne firm sent him the letter illustrated in Figure 1, together with 151 one cent stamps and 50 four cent stamps.

Students of private die medicine stamps

often have been unable to learn details about the manner in which the stamps were affixed to the products, which stamps

were affixed to which products in a firm's line, and how the stamps may have been used in combination to satisfy the tax in those situations wherein the denomination of a single stamp was not equal to the requisite tax. These de-

Remember also, that the Expectorant, Alterative, Hair Tonic and Liquid Hair Dye require each a Four Cent Stamp; Large Carminative, a Two Cent Stamp; Small Carminative, Tonic Vermifuge, Sanative Pills and Liniment, a One Cent Stamp; and the Ague Mixture, a Four and Two Cent Stamp.

Be careful not to Stamp Medicines that are already Stamped. All Stamps not needed, please return.

You will place the Stamps on the top of each bottle,—on the outside of the wrapper—the ends of the Stamp turning down on each side.

On the Liquid Hair Dye place the Stamp crosswise the lid of the box—the ends turning down over the sides, so as to fasten the lid to the box.

On the Sanative Pills place the Stamp lengthwise the box, over the fold of the wrapper, the lower edge resting just above the word "Jayne," which will bring the upper edge under the words "Prepared only,"—the ends turning over and fastening on the ends of the box. By so placing it, less of the reading matter will be covered than by any other way.

As above stated, each bottle of the Ague Mixture requires two Stamps—one of Four, and one of Two cents, each of which should be put on the top in the same manner as on the other articles.

Should the gum on the Stamps not seem sufficient to make them adhere firmly, they should be put on with paste, as the Stamp must remain attached, until the article is sold. This mode of affixing the Stamps, is in accordance with permission granted us by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

AGUE PILLS AND AMERICAN HAIR DYE

We have for some six or eight years past, been endeavoring to withdraw the Ague Pills and American Hair Dye from the market, and now, their sale continuing to be slow, we do not think it will pay us to have them stamped. If you have any of the Ague Pills on hand therefore, you will please give them away to persons, who, needing them, would be likely to use them, for in this way, they will, by relieving distress, benefit others, even if they produce no profit to ourselves. The American or Powder Hair Dye you will destroy at once.

DAMAGED MEDICINES.

The articles you report as so damaged as to be unsaleable, are too small in quantity to be returned to us. Your best course will be to give away immediately (such as are worth it,) to the poor who may need them, and at once destroy the remainder, as no medicines can be legally given away after 30th September next, unless stamped. Of course we do not wish them disposed of in such a manner as to interfere with your future sales, but rather to families who have never used them, and amongst whom, in the event of benefit being derived from their use, a future demand would result. If you cannot give them away by the proper time, please destroy them. Of course the Ague Pills, American Hair Dye, and damaged medicines thus disposed of, you will charge to us, to appear to your credit in next settlement.

tails pertaining to the Jayne stamps are now spelled out for collectors in Figure 1.

Figure 3 illustrates a bill that had been sent by the Jayne firm to Mr. Spaulding in the previous year. At a glance, the reader will see what the Jayne company's line of products consisted of, as well as what the retail and wholesale prices were. In fine print in the upper right corner of the bill appears the notice mentioned by Holcombe (Holcombe, 1939) about transition in the management of the firm. The notice is signed by David Jayne and advises that,

"The Manufacture and sale of my Family Medicines, heretofore conducted in my name, will hereafter be conducted under the firm of Dr. D. JAYNE & SON, to whom all letters should be addressed."

Bracketed in the lower left aspect of the Notice by the date February 16, 1855, appear the names of David Jayne, his two sons (David W. and Eben. C.), and John K. Walker.

Beneath the illustration of the Jayne building at 242 Chestnut Street appears the advice quoted by Holcombe in his article:

"By a recent Municipal Ordinance, the numbers of all buildings in the City have been changed, and a new system adopted; the Number of our Building under the old system was 84 Chestnut Street, by the new it is 242 Chestnut Street. We do, and shall continue to occupy the same Building as heretofore, the only change having been in its Number, as above stated."

Upon reading the form letter sent by the firm to Mr. Spaulding on September 1, 1863, one learns (Figure 1A) that the Jayne stamps were gummed. The bottles of Expectorant, Alterative, and Hair Tonic each required a single 4¢ stamp, as did each box of Liquid Hair Dye. Each large bottle of Carminative Balsam needed a 2¢ stamp. Each small bottle of Carminative Balsam required a 1¢ stamp, as did each bottle of Tonic Vermifuge and each bottle of Liniment, as well as each box of Sanative Pills. And each bottle of Ague Mixture required two

stamps: a 4¢ and a 2¢ denomination, in combination.

In affixing the stamps to bottles, the former were to be applied on the top of each bottle, on the outside of the wrapper, in such a way that the ends of the stamp turned down on each side. On the Liquid Hair Dye, the stamp was placed "...crosswise the lid of the box—the ends turning down over the sides, so as to fasten the lid to the box."

The firm prescribed the precise manner in which the 1¢ stamp was to be affixed to the boxes of Sanative Pills, as follows:

"On the Sanative Pills place the Stamp lengthwise the box, over the fold of the wrapper, the lower edge resting just above the word 'Jayne,' which will bring the upper edge under the words 'Prepared only,'—the ends turning over and fastening on the ends of the box. By so placing it, less of the reading matter will be covered than by any other way."

Although I previously had been unaware that medicine manufacturing companies sent revenue stamps to vendors of their medications for affixing to the products, I assumed that the Jayne company's assiduousness in this regard must have been prompted by a nuance in the tax laws.

The book by Michael Mahler entitled, *United States Civil War Revenue Stamp Taxes* is a cornucopia of information pertaining to the rulings and other actions of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue in response to questions pertaining to use of revenue stamps (Mahler, 1988). To learn more about the background of why the Jayne company had gone to such lengths in sending its stamps to Spaulding (and, one assumes, to many other druggists throughout the United States), I consulted both Mahler's book and the author, himself.

The original internal revenue Act of July 1, 1862, in setting penalties for various evasions of the law, was directed at *manufacturers* only. (See Secs. 107-110 of the United States statutes pertaining to documentary and proprietary stamp taxes as presented on pages 4 and 5 of Mahler's (1988) book.)

This left a loophole. A retailer could sell unstamped articles without incurring a penalty, whether he did so legitimately (for goods that had been manufactured before the taxes went into effect on August 1, 1862), or in defiance of the law.

The Act of March 3, 1863 closed this loophole. Sec. 27 (see page 16 of Mahler's book)

New Zealand social welfare stamps

New Zealand was affected as most countries were by the reduced spending that marked the Great Depression (sounds familiar). There were riots in various cities and the government realized that the time had come to create a method of support for the unemployed, and created the *Unemployment Amendment Act*

1931. Taking effect August 1, 1932, it was initially an emergency measure to last one year but this was later extended indefinitely. The initial tax was 1 ½% (which varied over the years reaching a maximum of 12 ½% in 1942) levied on all wages and salaries and was accounted for by means of stamps (Figure 1).

The design, it seems, is based on a reduced version of the 1929 health stamp and printed in sheets of 240.

Initially issued in 1931 these stamps remained in use until 1934 when the colors were changed. This lasted two years until a modified design incorporating a name change to "Employment" when a more positive outlook was desired (Figure 2). Starting that year (1936) the stamps were overprinted on a yearly basis. In 1939 the name was changed again to Social

advises.

"That any person who shall offer for sale, after the thirtieth of September, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, any of the articles named in Schedule C of the act to which this act is an amendment, whether the articles so offered are imported, or are of foreign or domestic manufacture, shall be deemed the manufacturer thereof, and subject to all the duties, liabilities, and penalties in said act imposed in regard to the sale of such articles without the use of the proper stamp or stamps, as in said act is required."

This change was to take effect on October 1, 1863. Thus, a scramble ensued to sell off all unstamped articles by September 30, 1863, or, failing that, to be certain that they all were stamped.

George S. Boutwell served as the first Commissioner of Internal Revenue. In Decision No. 126 issued in October of 1863 (see pages 225 and 226 of Mahler's book), Boutwell advised that, "From and after October 1, 1863, none of the articles named in Schedule C...can be law-

fully offered for sale without having the requisite stamp affixed." He added that, "All persons, whether dealers or manufacturers, are required to affix and duly cancel the stamps at once upon all such articles as are offered for sale by them."

Security (Figure 3). This remained in effect until 31 March 1958 when the system changed to a "Pay as you earn" income tax scheme, reflecting an enlarged scope of beneficiaries.

As with all New Zealand stamps, the study of the papers used adds another layer of complexity. The first printings

were on Cowan paper perforated 14 x 14. From 1932 onwards the stamps were perforated 14 x 15. Subsequent printings from 1932 were on

EXTRACT FROM

THE AGRICULTURAL WORKERS' ACT, 1936 AND EXTENSION ORDERS 2 AND 3. RELATING TO WAGES AND HOLIDAY BOOKS.

On every farm on which one or more agricultural workers are employed, the employer shall at all times, keep in the prescribed form a record showing, in the case of each worker:—

- (a) The name of the worker, together with his age if under 21 years;
- (b) Days on which the worker has been employed, or holidays or half-days allowed. (Note Holidays are recorded by an "H" in days columns);
- (c) Wages paid each pay day, together with the date;
- (d) Period to which the payment relates;
- (e) Amount due in respect of board and lodgings if not provided;
- (f) Amount of holiday pay and board allowance.

The entry of the particulars shall be signed by the agricultural worker at the time of the payment of his wages, and his signature shall operate as a receipt.

The wages and holiday book in use for the time being, and any such book used within the preceding two years, shall at all times be open to inspection by any Inspector.

Every agricultural worker who fails to sign the record, or who wilfully signs an incorrect record, shall be liable to a fine of £5.

watermark), although in 1937 some 1d, 3d and 4d values were printed on Cowan (horizontal mesh, single watermark) paper. The social security stamps initial printings were on Wiggins-Teape chalk surfaced paper with single watermark. Unsurfaced paper was used from 1942 on, with inverted multiple watermark paper used 1953–55 and fine unsurfaced horizontal mesh paper in April 1955.

Hours were recorded in a

wage book with the stamps affixed in an adjacent space and signed by the wage earner (see Figure 4). As the instructions indicate (Figure 5) if these taxes were not paid in proper fashion a severe penalty was placed on the owner. The books were to be available for government auditors who would drop in and check the books.

change was made. Or it may also indicate an expiration date if your name ever appeared on the Dropped for Non-Payment of Dues list.

We would also like to point out that in the membership directory and on the mailing labels we do not use "P. O." or "Post Office" with box numbers as a way of conserving space within the data base and printed listings as well as saving time keying the entries for U. S. A. addresses. The U. S. Postal Service has informed both your editor and our printer that this indication is not necessary. "Box 000" means the same as "P. O. Box 000" and that private mail boxes should be indicated similar to an apartment number following the street address.

Exposing fiscal philately to the non-philatelic public

The annual Tri-State Collectors' Exhibition held at the Community Center of the state capital in Concord, NH, provided ARA member Frederick Brofos of Warner an opportunity to show philately, especially revenues, to the general public. Mr. Brofos showed 72 pages of U. S. private die proprietary medicine tax stamps. Included in the exhibit was associated billheads, advertising covers and trade cards. The venue also allowed a display case of medicine bottles,

some with original labels and tax stamps, to be shown as well. The Concord *Union Leader* noted the exhibit in the headline of the story about the show.

Opportunities such as this can provide philately, and the specific area of fiscal, positive exposure to the non-philatelist. While billheads and trade cards may not go well in a conventional philatelic competition, they are eye catching and help to attract interest in our hobby.

1994 ARA Convention

The 1994 ARA Convention will be held September 30—October 2 in conjunction with the Philadelphia National Stamp Exhibition. Held at the Valley Forge Convention Center in King of Prussia, this show was formerly known as SEPAD, however, the names of both the show and the sponsoring organization have now been changed. This will also be the annual convention for the State Revenue Society. The American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors

will also hold a meeting.

As of mid-February the prospectus for the show is in preparation and will be reproduced on the mailing wrapper as soon as available. The show chairman has informed your editor that space in the show hotel is expected to be quickly filled. Discount rates can be obtained only by booking rooms through the PNSE. We will be informed as soon as possible with information to appear in this journal.

The Revenue Journal of Great Britain—December 1993

The December issue of the Revenue society of Great Britain's journal leads off with a discussion of "Style and Success" by the editor Clive Akerman. He repeats the observation that the gold medal exhibits of a few years ago cannot come close to that level today, an observation that he reinforces with examples of current revenue exhibits being shown by some of the society's members.

"British Commonwealth Fiscal Cancellations" by Regis Hoffman (the same article that appeared in the November–December issue of *The American Revenuer*) follows. Other ar-

ticles include "An unrecorded essay from Kolhapur (India)" by Abdul Mollah, a continuation of "Argentina—the stamped paper" by Clive Akerman and a wide ranging variety of short reviews, news notes and reports of society meetings.

The Revenue Journal of Great Britain is published quarterly by the Revenue Society of Great Britain and is available by membership. Information about membership appears in the society's advertisement that appears in this journal (see the January or the March issues).

The September-October 1993 issue of *The State Revenue Newsletter* featured a report by Scott Troutman on behalf of the Bedding Study Group. Troutman comments about the session laws for each state that are found in law libraries around the country. These books contain the laws for a state as passed by their legislature and provide a basic source of information about various state revenue stamps. Other short items touch on subjects such as South Carolina drug stamps, Indiana real estate stamps, Connecticut and Washington wildlife

stamps, a listing of state duck stamp agencies, the demise of California Department of Motor Vehicle stamps and illustrations of a 1937 Illinois permit for out of state car and a document bearing a Virginia tax on seals stamp.

The State Revenue Newsletter is printed bimonthly by the State Revenue Society. Subscription is by membership in the society with annual dues being \$10. Information can be obtained from society president Peter Martin, box 505, Springfield, VA 22150.

Luren-February 1994

While not dedicated to revenues, *Luren*, the newsletter of the Scandinavian Philatelic Library of Southern California, Inc., often contains significant items about Scandinavian revenues. The February 1994 issue contains an article by Dr. Dan Laursen entitled "Danish Radio Tax Stamps" which illustrates the radio license cards with various stamps and imprints attached. Dr. Laursen also translated "Revenues, that is Høye Taastrup" an article in

a non-philatelic magazine that tells about the government office in Denmark that supervises tax collection by stamps.

Luren is published monthly by the library and edited by ARA member Paul Nelson. Annual dues are \$10; More information about the Scandinavian Philatelic Library of Southern California, Inc. can be obtained by writing to Box 310, Claremont, CA 91711.

On December 4, Cal-Rev, the California ARA chapter, met in Redwood City. Discussion within the group centered around in inclusion of beer stamps in the 1994 Scott Specialized catalog and the then recent ARA convention. The meeting ended with a revenue stamp trading session.

The group met again on February 5 at Pinepex in El Sobrante. Eighteen revenuers attended the meeting (Bruce Brunill drove three hours to get there) which lasted 2 and a half hours. The program featured Gary Lacrosse who spoke about Colombian revenues. His presentation included copies of Bill welsh's exhibit and sheets of the national revenues and triangles that were passed around. He showed examples of telegraph cards and is trying to find additional information about them. There are no revenue collectors in Co-

Literature in Review

Guatemalan Telegraph Stamps and Stationery, by James C. Andrews (ISBN 1-880721-01-5). 24 pages, 7x 10 inches, card cover, saddle stapled, priced, illustrated. Published by The International Society of Guatemala Collectors. Available from Michael J. Barie, ISGC Librarian, Box 1445, Detroit, MI 48231 for \$5 postpaid in the United States, \$6 postpaid foreign surface mail, \$7 foreign airmail.

The title above is that given on the title page and the information sheet that accompanied the review copy of this booklet, however, the cover title is *A Handbook of Guatemalan Telegraph Stamps* by which this publication may become know. Just beware if you see either title on a list of literature for sale, both titles refer to the same booklet.

The 17 stamps discussed in this book were listed in the society's 1974 publication *Guatemala-2*. This, though, is a specialized listing with a more detailed examination of varieties, forgeries, proofs, essays, corrections to previous lists and a partial listing and illustrations of telegram forms and delivery envelopes. The catalog listings do have current estimates of market prices.

The various issues are extensively discussed and include such information as quantities printed (or overprinted as many telegraph issues were postage stamps with telegraph over-

Without a doubt this will be "the Swiss catalog." Since the mid-1980s Denis Gainon has been producing a series of catalogs devoted to a single canton. Now, with this volume, he has incorporated all of those catalogs, added the rest of the cantons and included the federal issues, municipal issues and the tourism stamps issued by various cantons, regions, municipalities and public authorities.

If you can understand Forbin, you can understand the listings in this catalog without necessarily understanding French. Gainon

prints), legal background, cancels, gum, proofs and essays, remainders and minor varieties. The catalog listings are easy to use but since they are buried in the text, they can be hard to find-a contrasting typeface or a box around the listing would have helped here. The commentary is well documented but references in the text use yet another a set of unintelligible abbreviations consisting of one to three letters; it would seem that since this was composed on a computer and printed on a laser printer a word search could have been done to replace these letters with a more complete or understandable citation. (For example (H) refers to Telegraph and Telephone Stamps of the World, a priced and annotated catalog by S. E. R. Hiscocks. The citation (Hiscocks, 1982) would have been more understandable.)

Minor, nit-picky faults aside, this is an excellent handbook on a small, often overlooked area of philately. These stamps issued from 1898 to 1930 offer all of the charm and interest of the pre-made-for-collectors stamps and give the collector the challenge of a real hunt for the material at a modest price (the most expensive item being a fake of the 100c blue green with red overprint of 1898, listed at \$40 unused and \$50 used. A very commendable effort.

Kenneth Trettin

makes extensive use of symbols in the listings. The entire catalog is apparently produced on a high resolution laser printer. The listings are in two columns on large pages and illustrated with clean clear scans of the stamps. The use of varying size type and the contrasting serif and san serif type faces result in a Swiss catalog done the way a catalog should be produced.

It should be noted that the earlier single canton catalogs contained additional commentary about each issue such as tax rates and laws affecting each issue. This information is mostly missing in the new volume so you will want to hang onto your old catalogs.

This catalog is a "must have" for all collectors of Swiss revenues. For those who collect revenue literature—you will love this work, it is definitely one of the very best catalog productions in years.

Retail Liquor Dealer STS with change of address endorsement for one day



Mr. Seretto's address is given as 321 Water Street but an endorsement on the back transfers the holder's address "for one day to Sami Park, Fitchburg, Mass." Collector Joseph P. Carney dated this endorsement "7-29-34" which one might assume to be the day the stamp was transferred. Since the temporary address is "Sami Park" one might conclude that this was for some sort of a celebration and that Angelo Seretto ran a beer tent in the city park.

Has anyone else seen a similar endorsement or is this a unique item.

New Japanese revenue design released

by Terence Hines, ARA and Akihiro Asano

A 200 yen revenue stamp with a new design has been recently released by Japan. The stamp, printed in green with a gray security inscription in tiny letters, is illustrated. The stamp is perforated 13 and is printed in sheets of 100. The printing mark, seen in the selvege of the illustrated stamp, consists of one green and one gray line and occurs only once per sheet of 100.

The Japanese tax laws currently impose stamp taxes on receipts. the ¥200 stamp pays the lowest possible rate of tax. This is charged

for receipts of between ¥30,000 and ¥1,000,000 and for receipts with no amount indicated. As the amount of the receipt increases, the tax also increases with receipts of over ¥1,000,000,000 being taxed ¥200,000. A copy of the full listing of current Japanese tax rates has been deposited in the ARA Library. This one page listing is in Japanese.

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
