



## Jordan's fiscal overprints, 1920–1926

#### by Richard B. Rose

As is common in many *rentier* and taxfarming states, the Ottoman regime collected most of its revenues from surcharges on services and monopolies (tobacco, salt, matches, etc.), so when the Allied Powers assumed administration over formerly Ottoman territories, they were obliged to continue this practice, in the absence of any more effective means of collecting revenue.



Thus the British and French administrations in Egypt, Syria, Palestine and Iraq quickly continued to issue fiscal stamps of various types even before postal stamps were prepared. Given the meager resources of the Transjordan territory, and the marginal interest Jordanian stamps receive compared to Lebanon or Egypt, it is not surprising that very little is known about the initial revenue issues for this region. This report is based upon the several books writ-

Figure 1. First Series printed on white paper. ten by K.C.R. Souan on the *Philatelic History* of Jordan, and access to some unusual specimens in a private stamp collection in Jordan. Inevitably, this research must be ongoing, as we must uncover many more examples of revenue stamps in order to complete this listing.

As a general rule, the British administration prepared stamps for fiscal use by applying additional overprints to the regular postal issues, until a definitive fiscal series appears in Palestine and Jordan in 1928. This also points out the fact that Transjordan depended upon the Palestine administration for printing presses, paper, and transportation.

The fiscal stamps issued prior to 1928 fall into five series.

#### First series 1918-1919

The First Series, that of 1918–1919, was printed on white paper by the Greek Patriarchate Press in Jerusalem. In this same format were also produced O. P. D. A. (Ottoman Public Debt Administration) and H. J. Z. (Hejaz Railway Jordan Zone) stamps for Palestine; the denominations are unknown.

The 10 mil value illustrated was printed in green ink, and as was done with other white-paper stamps, ۱۰ مل شرق ألاردن

each value may have been printed in a different color. The inscription reads "Revenues / [value] / East of Jordan." (Figure 1).

The "East of Jordan" شرق ألاردن overprint (top line) was applied first for postal use, and the value changes surcharged later were also postal, in various colors and shades. The bottom two lines shown here identifies these as fiscal revenue stamps, and is usually in violet ink. Unlike the *hukûmat/government* overprints applied to postal issues from 1923 to 1925, which read "Arab Government of the East" دكومة ألشرق ألاردن, the fiscal overprints read "East Jordan Government" the middle of the overprint is expressed as a portion (*qîmah*, ألقرمة, the fiscal overprints, the قيمة

being in much larger script than the fraction which follows. Additionally, the fraction value is usually in violet ink, while the  $q\hat{m}ah$  is in (pale, shades) black. These surcharges and overprints follow no pattern, but were usually applied one on top of the other. Only scattered values of these fiscal overprints have been observed, and some of them lack either the "East of Jordan" or the *hukûmat/government* overprint entirely.

**A**. No copies seen although postage stamps cancelled in ink were most likely used on revenue documents (see Figure 2).

**B**. Souan (1972, p41) states "unknown quantities were also overprinted for Revenue purposes".

C. Souan (1972, p49) lists a 5 pi and 9 pi values overprinted for fiscal purposes. A 1 mil. brown is also illustrated (Figure 3). On the underlying stamps, the first overprint is the *East of Jordan*; the second is a dated gov-

ernment overprint, but on stamps intended for fiscal use, this government overprint (type T4 in Gibbons) differs from the postage version by the absence of the bottom two lines Nisan (=April) year 1923. Like the postal overprint, the fiscal version was applied in various shades of purple. Figure 4

illustrates this fiscal version of the government overprint as applied to an Ottoman revenue stamp, which affords a clearer image.

D. Souan (1972, p56) lists these values from the 1923 series surcharged for fiscal use: <sup>5</sup>⁄10 piastre on 2 mils (blue and violet overprints), 1 piastre on 1 mil, <sup>5</sup>⁄10 piastre on 3 mils (SG 78), and <sup>5</sup>⁄10 piastre on 9 piastre (SG 79d), as well as a <sup>5</sup>⁄10 piastre on 3 mils lacking the ألارين .شرق (page 57; see also page 71). In addition, a 5 mil. orange is illustrated. (Figure 5)

E. The  $\frac{1}{2}$  pi scarlet and 1 pi. blue Hejaz stamps were overprinted for fiscal use (Souan, 1972, p76), which presumably means that the overprint reads *hukumatu'lsharq al-urdun* instead of *hukumatu'l-sharq al-'arabiya* 

#### Third series 1924

The Third Series (1924) was overprinted in Amman on:






Figure 6. Hejaz ½ pi. red, Third Series A revenue.

A. Hejaz stamps (Scott type A7, Gibbons

type 11) such as were overprinted for postal use in Trans-Jordan in April 1923. Figure 6 illustrates a  $\frac{1}{2}$  pi. red.

**B**. Palestine EEF stamps not previously overprinted for use in Transjordan.

revenue; EEF for Hejaz RR and EEF for general revenue. Figure 7 shows a 10 pi. ultramarine (on Scott Palestine 13), and Jacobs describes the same fiscal overprint on the 9 pi. bistre (Scott Palestine 12). The initials printed on the stamps signify Arab Government of the East. Sometimes the 'tâbi' [stamp] is abbreviated: L with a semicolon. Often there is a new value surcharged as well. Like most fiscals, these are heavily cancelled by hand in ink, so the three initials may be present, but hard to distinguish.

1343 are SG125-134/Sc 113-121 to which has been added Hejaz stamp, طابع حجازي indicating that these were intended for the Hejaz Railway debentures. Figure 8 shows the 2 pi orange, also illustrated by Jacobs, who also shows a 1 pi. dark blue.

The date in Arab numerals is the Hegira year 1343=August 1924-July 1925 (Gregorian).

#### Fifth series 1925

The Fifth Series, 1925, was overprinted in London by Waterlow in two types, over the November 1922 issue for Palestine. Based on the printer's accounts for this Waterlow series, we know which values were overprinted for revenues<sup>1</sup>.

These fiscal stamps were of two types, those for general fiscal use, and those designated for the maintenance of Hejaz railway and its debt obligations (continuing the same use as the Ottoman Hejaz R.R. fiscals, and also continued by the French in their Syrian zones).

A. The values overprinted Hejazi حجازى were 5 mils, the 1, 2, 5, 10 and 20 piastres (Figure 9).

B. Those overprinted wardat واردات (revenues) were the 1 and 5 mils, the 1, 2, 5, 10 and 20 piastres, and also a 2 1/2 mils. over-

printed on the 3 mils<sup>2</sup> [fig.10]. Figure 11 is a postal stamp with the واردات and 5 mills overprinted in red.

The basic Palestine stamps used are the same as the London II issues for Palestine, exhibiting the design and color variations of this Waterlow printing, compared to the London I printing.

#### A Review

## The revenue stamped papers of Bharatpur

#### by Forrest Shoemaker, ARA

The Princely State of Bharatpur, one of the Rajputana states of the lower Punjab. was founded by the Yadav Rajputs, of the martial Jat race, through a history of warfare and brigandage. Bharatpur was recognized as a separate State in 1722, becoming a regional military power that reached a zenith with the capture of Agra in 1761. Upon expulsion from Agra in 1774, the State of Bharatpur began a long decline, with a succession of weak Rajahs who dissipated the wealth and power of the people in futile endeavors and dissolute lifestyles. Rajah Jaswar Singh was deposed to exile in 1900 for the murder of a servant. A further succession of Rajahs, including another exile, ruled until incorporation into the Republic of India.

During the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century, Bharatpur issued several series of Revenue Stamped Papers, the Oval Medallion design in 3 major Types and one subtype, for Court Fee or Revenue use as needed. The Koeppel and Manners catalog for these papers gives a beginning to the Series in 1883, with a change from a blue die to black, followed by reversion to the original blue die, with the Series finally being phased out in favor of an engraved design by Thomas de la Rue Company in 1927. During this period, the basic design remained the same but for a change of die in 1900, and a switch between the A.D. calendar and the Samvat calendar of native India.

According to the 1989 K&M catalog, the Series began as a blue die printing on 9 x11 inches native wove paper in 1883, with the letters S.I.S.B. within the medallion and Samvat Year 1940, converted to black die printings in 1887 A.D. In 1894 A.D., the paper was changed to 8  $\frac{1}{4}$  x 13 inches, followed in 1900 A.D. by changing the letters within the medallion to "S.O.S.B.," and was discontinued in 1904. Then in 1927 A.D., the Series was again produced, with a reversion to the blue die printings, the original small-size paper, and the Stamp Office lettering. be shown as follows:

- a. (1883) The blue die printings begin the Series on small size paper.
- b. (1887) Conversion to black die printing.
- c. (1894) Conversion to large size paper (8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> x 13 inches)
- d. (1896) Conversion to A.D. calendar from Samvat
- e. (1899) Reversion to Samvat calendar
- f. (1900) Change in die lettering from S.I.S.B. to S.O.S.B.
- g. (1904) Lapse in the Series
- h. (1927) Re-issue of the Series, reversion to blue die, S.I.S.B. lettering, A.D. calendar, and small size paper. Additional years are known to exist to 1939 A.D.

A detailed examination of the papers of this Type reveals the current K&M listings and chronology to be in error. I present a completely revised listing below, which also adds new denominations and subtypes when known, and corrects the original K&M chronology where errors are discovered. This new listing sequence eliminates the previously believed reversion to the original color of issue, the return to small paper, and the reversion to the early die lettering. Not only is the chronology of these papers simplified; the year of inception may now be pushed back from 1883 A.D. to at least 1870 A.D. The last year of issue is similarly pushed back from 1927 A.D. to 1905 A.D.

This new chronology is simplified to the following:

- i (1870) The blue die printings on small size paper begin the Series
- j (1887) Conversion to black die printing on small size paper (some mixed use)
- k (1894) Conversion to large size paper
- 1 (1896) Conversion to A.D. calendar from Samvat (Samvat date less 57 years equals A.D.)
- m (1899) Reversion to Samvat calendar from A.D. calendar
- n (1900) Change in die lettering from S.I.S.B. to S.O.S.B
- o Termination of the Series (1905)

Examination of the papers listed by K&M as being issued in 1927 A.D. reveals hand-




Figure 1. The "hidden" Urdu dates. This date is 1876 A.D.  $(1^{<y})$

This chronology from the K&M catalog can

written Urdu dates in the A.D. calendar, proving the papers were not issued in 1927 A.D., but in 1927 Samvat, or 1870 A.D. See Fig. 1 for an example of this "hidden" dating. A number of other papers between 1870 A.D. and 1883 A.D. are also listed here for the first time, some of which also contain handwritten dates in Urdu. It was previously believed these papers, dated 1927-1939, were issued under the A.D. calendar, but this may now be shown to have been the Samvat calendar, and the chronology is corrected ac-

cordingly 57 years. An asterisk (\*) indicates a new listing from K&M. Rather than completely renumbering the existing K&M listings, I add alphabet letters to the numbers where the current numbering in K&M does not allow for a sufficient numbering sequence.

I list first the Judicial papers, K&M Type 5, which is unchanged except for a new year of issue. Type 7 is not listed here, as the existing K&M catalog is sufficient.




Figure 3. Change in lettering to S.O.S.B.



1904 is apparently the final year of issue for the Revenue Series, 1905 for the Judicial. A new design, the rectangular Coat of Arms Series by Thomas de la Rue, K&M Type 20, was introduced as a replacement as early as 1917, according to dates of use, although Koeppel and Manners dates the new Series as 1927.

Other collectors will no doubt be able to advise of additional denominations, errors, and perhaps years of issue earlier than 1870

## Coin operated devices special tax stamps



#### by Terence Hines, ARA

The illustrated \$1000 special tax stamp for "coin operated amusement devices" recently passed through my hands. It is a very nice item, if only because \$1000 was a lot of money in 1950. But it is also a puzzling item. The tax rate is, obviously, \$100 per device. But, according to Table 87 in my 1977 book on special tax stamps, the tax rate for FYE (fiscal year ending) 1951 stamps was \$150 per device. This discrepancy led me back to the statute books. My research led to a resolution of the discrepancy and also shed light on several other aspects of the special taxes on the various classes of amusement devices.

Coin operated amusement and gaming devices were first taxed under the Revenue Act of 1941 (55 Stat. 412, sec. 3267). Two types of devices were taxed. A tax of \$ 10 per year per device was levied on "so-called 'pin-ball' and

or later than 1904. There is still the question to be answered by proof of papers as to the years between 1905 and 1917. Either the dates of issue for the Oval Medallion or the Coat of Arms Series can be extended forward and back to fill the gap, or there is perhaps an as yet unknown Type awaiting discovery.

Mollah, of Maharashtra, India, for his assistance and advice in the preparation of this article. other similar amusement machines, operated by means of the insertion of a coin, token, or similar object." A tax of \$50 per year for each device was levied on "so- called 'slot' machines which operate by the means of insertion of a coin, token, or similar object and which, by application of the element of chance, may deliver, or entitle the person playing or operating the machine to receive cash, premiums, merchandise, or tokens."

These taxes became effective October 1, 1941. The Act specifically stated (Section 3267 (d)) that "with respect to the year ending June 30, 1942, no tax shall be payable under this part for any period prior to Oct. 1, 1941." Thus, while I give face values of \$10 in Tables 84 (Coin-operated amusement devices) and 86 (Coin-operated amusement devices-devices awarding no prizes) and \$50 in Table 87 (Coin-operated gaming devices) in my book, these are most likely not the face values of the stamps themselves. Since only 9 months were left in the fiscal year, the face values of the stamps were probably \$7.50 and \$37.50, respectively. Can any reader confirm this?

By the Revenue Act of 1942 (56 Stat. 619, sec. 617) the definition of devices taxed at the \$ 10 rate was expanded. Such taxable devices now included "any amusement or music machine." In other words, the jukebox at the malt shop was now taxed at the rate of \$10 a year. It was, presumably, the addition of the category of "music devices" that resulted in the issuance of stamps for FYE 1943 only for "Coin-operated amusement devices: Issued for devices newly taxable under the Revenue Act of 1942." Table 85 in my book. The Act of 1942 also specified that amusement devices which gave out prizes of merchandise worth 5 cents or less were to be taxed at the lower, \$10, rate and not as slot machines. This distinction is probably the reason for the separate issuance, in FYE 1942 and 1943, of separate stamps for "Coin-operated amusement devices (Devices awarding no prizes)," listed in Table 86. The Act also increased the tax on slot machines from \$50 to \$ 100 per year.

Different parts of the Act of 1942 became effective at different times. The increased tax rate on slot machines was made effective July 1, 1943, so the first stamps to show this rate would be dated for the FYE 1944. In the case of the newly taxed devices, the tax became effective Nov. 1, 1942. This left 8 months in the fiscal year and explains the fact that the stamps issued for FYE 1943 for these newly taxable devices have a face value not of \$10, but \$6.67. For devices giving out prizes worth 5 cents or less, the tax was made effective July 1, 1942. Since by the Revenue Act of 1941, such devices were presumably classified as slot machines and taxed at the higher rate of \$50, this clause may have resulted in refunds of \$40 per machine to those who had paid the higher rate. I can find no explanation in the Act of 1941 or 1942 for the existence of stamps for "devices awarding no prizes" for FYE 1942.

The rate on slot machines was increased to \$150 per device per year by the Revenue Act of 1950 (64 Stat. 964). However, that increase did not become effective until November 1, 1950, leaving only two thirds of the fiscal year for which the new rate was in effect. Thus, stamps for FYE 195 1, like the one shown above, have a face value of \$100, two thirds of \$150.00. The very next year, the Revenue Act of 1951 (65 Stat. 452) raised the rates again, this time to \$250. This Act became effective Nov. 1, 1951. In my book (Table 87) I list the \$250 value for FYE 1952 stamps. Since, once again, the new rate became effective a third of the way into the fiscal year, the stamps (none of which seem to have been reported) would probably have had a face value of \$166.67. Only stamps for FYE 1953 would have the full \$250 face value.

### Awards Chairman's report

The highest award in philately, The Champion of Champions, went to Michael Mahler's United States Civil War Fiscal History: a survey of the documentary taxes.

## Josef Schonfeld: 1911-2001

Revenue expert Josef Schonfeld of Victoria, British Columbia, died February 9 at age 89.

Born in Vienna, Austria, in 1911, Mr. Schonfeld was engaged in the family business of wholesale stationers, printers and manufacturers of envelopes. He also was an enthusiastic mountaineer and skier.

Mr. Schonfeld left for England in 1938. After the war, he became a naturalized British subject and moved to Canada in 1950.

He first worked with a local stamp dealer in Toronto and later, until his retirement, in the Department of Geography in the University of British Columbia.

His collecting interest began at an early age, but his real interest began when he received a large packet of Austrian revenue enues, so bring your duplicates. stamps as a gift.

In the early 1930s, he added many foreign revenues to his collection and by the time he had reached London, he had collected more than 3,000.

When he emigrated to Canada, his collection had increased to 20,000. Collecting worldwide revenues continued at an increasing pace until a collection of more than 60,000 was reached.

In his early years, he published several articles in the now defunct *Bulletin of the Canadian Revenue Society*, in *The American Revenuer* and in *Linn's Stamp News*.

He regularly prepared the index for *The American Revenuer* and long before the use of computers, he had a card index of more than 2,000 items recording fiscal literature or mentions of fiscal stamps.

British embossed revenues held a special attraction for him, and an embryo of a catalog was begun about 1952.

Quite independently, Samuel B. Frank also was working on a similar catalog with the assistance of Marcus Samuel who examined the Specimen Books at Somerset House, London. On becoming aware of each other's work, Frank and Mr. Schonfeld joined forces.

With the help of William A. Barber of

Chesapeak, Virginia, who illustrated all the known stamp designs, they produced their catalog in 1970 called *The Stamp Duty of Great Britain and Ireland...from 1694* in three volumes.

A second edition (with prices) for Great Britain was published in 1981 and the third edition by Mr. Schonfeld and Barber and Brown was published in 1998.


